BUBBLE RING
1 cake compressed yeast
1/2 cup lukewarm water
1 cup milk
5 tablespoons shortening

5 tablespoons sugar
2 teaspoons salt
3-4 cups Fisher's Blend Flour

Crumble yeast and soak in lukewarm water. Scald milk. Add shortening, sugar and salt. Cool to lukewarm. Add yeast and water. Sift and measure Fisher's Blend Flour. Add flour gradually, beating until smooth. Turn dough onto a lightly floured board. Knead well. Place in bowl. Great top lightly. Cover and let rise in warm place (80-85° F.) until doubled in bulk, about 1 1/2 hours. Punch down. Form dough into balls about the size of a walnut. Dip in melted shortening and then in a mixture of 1/2 cup sugar and 1 tablespoon cinnamon. Arrange balls rock-wall fashion two rows high, in greased 8-in. ring mold or sponge cake pan. Let rise until half again its original size. Bake at 400° F. 25 to 30 minutes. Serves 8 to 10.
