It was Brooks Holder night at Wrigley field when Oakland whipped Los Angeles last night. There were no advance preparations, no speeches, but Brooks decided to have a night — and what a night!

The veteran outfielder just about single-handedly won the ball game. The final score was 5 to 3. Brooks came to bat in the fifth inning with the Angels leading, 2-0, by virtue of Malone's homer with one on in the second. He caught one of La Franconi's hooks and slammed it out of Wrigley field, scoring Lillard, Christopher and Hayes ahead of him.

Historic Coburg Castle Looted of Valuable Art

COBURG, Germany — (AP) — Military government officials said thieves have robbed historic Coburg castle of art objects which German police valued at \$200,000. The loot included two silver clocks presented to the Duke of Coburg by Queen Victoria of Britain, and three paintings.

Military government officials said the thieves entered the castle — now an art museum — by removing the iron bars from a window. They cut the paintings from their frames. A solid silver ship model, apparently too heavy to abduct, was found lying outside the building.

Coburg castle dates back to the 13th century.

Mary Lee Taylor's Chocolate Marshmallow Sauce
Broadcast: May 15, 1948

2 1/2 tablespoons cocoa
1 1/2 tablespoons sugar
few grains salt
2 1/2 cups Pet Milk
2 tablespoons water
12 marshmallows (3 oz.)
1/2 teaspoon vanilla

Mix together cocoa, sugar and salt. Stir in milk and water slowly. Cook and stir over boiling water about 5 minutes, or until smooth. Add marshmallows. Continue cooking over boiling water until marshmallows are almost dissolved. Remove from heat; add vanilla. Stir until marshmallows are melted and sauce is smooth. Cover and cool, but do not chill. Serve on ice cream, puddings, baked custard or plain cake. Makes 1/4 cup.
