Reciprocal Trade Act Extension Given O.K.

WASHINGTON, May 14.—(AP)—The House Republican Steering Committee yesterday approved a one-year extension of the reciprocal trade act. The GOP leaders said the act should be revised, however, to give Congress veto powers over any trade treaty exceeding tariff rate bounds set by the Federal Tariff Commission.

Speaker Martin told reporters there was general agreement among Republican House leaders to press the bill to House passage immediately.

President Truman has asked for a three-year extension of the trade act which is due to expire June 12.

Sale of Tickets For Posse's Rodeo To Open Saturday

Tickets for the Sheriff's Posse rodeo June 19 and 20 at the Fair Grounds will go on sale starting Saturday at a booth to be set up on South Jackson street, announced Dick Baker, co-chairman with Sig Fett for the affair. The booth will be open daily from 9 a. m. to 4 p. m.

Baker stated that all seats will be numbered and reserved, and that no general admission seats will be sold. This decision of the Rodeo committee has been made to facilitate taking care of spectators at the big show with the least possible confusion, said Baker.

Because of the narrow road leading to the Fair Grounds, it will be necessary to park automobiles as quickly as possible in the parking lot. Consequently, it will be necessary for everyone to have his ticket ahead of time, to preclude any delay at the grounds, according to Baker.

The Lions Club food booth will take care of all persons wishing to eat their noon meals at the Fair Grounds, and people are urged to come as quickly as possible after the up-town parade is over. All spectators will be required to remain in the grandstands, Baker said.

The people cooperated well last year, and the same cooperation is hoped for this year, he said. Tickets will be priced from \$1.50 to \$3.00.

Presbyterian Ministers Ask Increase in Salary

PHILADELPHIA, May 14.—(AP)—The General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in the U.S.A. has received an overtone seeking adjustment of Presbyterian ministers' salaries to meet the increase in the cost of living.

The request was sent from the Presbytery of Donegal and will be placed in the hands of the Bills and Overtures Committee of the forthcoming 160th general assembly of the church in the U.S.A. at Seattle, May 27-June 2.

The Donegal Presbytery's overtone urged that each Presbytery throughout the church appoint a committee of laymen to study reports on salaries gathered by moderators and stated clerks of Presbyteries.

The Presbytery of Seattle has sent an overtone citing the national shift of population to the west and calling for establishment of new churches in that area. The overtone asks the general assembly to authorize the Board of National Missions of the church in the U.S.A. to make available \$500,000 for building grants.

Newsman Exempted From "Secrets" Bill

WASHINGTON, May 14.—(AP)—The house voted yesterday to exempt newsmen from penalties of the so-called "secrets" bill. The bill provides fines and imprisonment for making public information given to a congressional committee and marked confidential by the committee. Another provision requires that government agencies must give information to congressional committees on demand.

Rep. Brown (R-Ohio) offered an amendment to exempt news

reporters and limit the penalties to members of Congress and employees of Congressional committees. It was approved without opposition.

Rep. McCormack (D-Mass.) said that newsmen, even though exempted by amendment, might face punishment for conspiracy if they persuaded a congressman to "leak" confidential information.

"I hope," he said, "they will not try to put any of us in jail if this bill should become law."
