wicked opponents at home who will charge that they are afraid to fight. Nobody loves a leader who is afraid to fight. So there might be trouble on that score. Politics, you see, is politics the world over.

BUT for just one thing, we could sit back and let events in Palestine take their course. Our big worry is that if the fighting between Jews and Arabs gets hot Russia will move in on the pretext that the fighting ought to be stopped and nobody else seems to be willing to stop it. Once Russia gets an army into Palestine she will be very likely to keep it there. That would be embarrassing to us. Such is diplomacy.

ABOUT the only thing that stands out clearly from this Palestine mess is that our leadership there has been poor. We have backed and filled. We have talked one way one day and another way the next day. We have marched boldly up the hill and then have turned around and marched right down again. As a result of this off and on ag'ly policy our prestige has suffered greatly.

Our adventures in foreign policy so far haven't paid much in the way of dividends.

Maurice Moore, Retired Timber Cruiser, Dies

Maurice Moore, retired timber cruiser, formerly of Roseburg, died at his home in Eugene May 12. He was born at Door County, Wis., Feb. 15, 1864, and came to Roseburg 48 years ago. He was a resident here 21 years, moving to Eugene in 1921.

MAN OR ISSUE?

The contest for the Oregon governorship is taking on the appearance of one of the prohibition battles of times past. Douglas McKay, leading Republican contestant for the position now held by Governor John H. Hall, has succeeded in making the legislative records of the two candidates the main issue in the gubernatorial race. Hall's record very uniformly has been on the side of liberalization of the state's liquor and gambling laws, while McKay has just as consistently voted for tight controls.

Although we have a personal preference for McKay, largely because of our acquaintance with him and our confidence in his qualifications, while we know Governor Hall only casually, we are wondering if McKay has not erred in forcing the contest into a wet-and-dry fight and thus distracting voter attention from a strict comparison of the qualifications of the candidates for the state's highest executive position.

If McKay is beaten, he can, in our opinion, attribute at least a part of the adverse vote to his own insistence that the election of a governor be based upon issues rather than upon the respective abilities of the men seeking the office. Oregon has always stood as one of the more pious states. It was a strong prohibition state. The state constitution forbids gambling. Our Knox liquor law is one of the best models of strict state control. But Oregon's position is not without hypocrisy. While we forbid gambling, the state spreads its skirts to hide pari-mutuel betting on horse and dog races while taking a cut for the state treasury. Our officials rise in political indignation at times to make voting fodder of a crusade against gambling, but slot machines, punch boards, and gaming devices are not so hidden that the public finds difficulty in locating a place to spend its nickels. No card player has any great amount of trouble finding a poker game if he is in earnest about risking his cash on the luck of the draw.

This situation indicates that a large segment of our population favors liberalization of liquor laws and gambling regulations and if the governor is to be elected by resolving an issue rather than through comparison of respective qualifications for executive administration, McKay may have put himself in an unfavorable spot. For not only has he alienated the native liquor-by-the-drink advocate, but Oregon has gained approximately 40 per cent in population since the last gubernatorial election, the bulk of this gain being represented by new residents from California and Washington, where liquor and gaming regulations are much less strict than in Oregon, the newcomers doubtless having a majority favoring liberalization.

Governor Hall and "Doug" McKay have several things in common. Both are native Oregonians. Both are veterans. Hall served in the Navy in the First World War while McKay was in the Army. McKay also served with the Army in the second World War. Both have had long service in the state legislature.

Hall, member of a prominent Portland law firm, has served in the House of Representatives for five terms. He was elected Speaker of the House in 1947 and took over the office of governor suddenly when Governor Earl Snell and President of the Senate Cornett, together with Secretary of State Bob Farrell, were killed in an airplane crash.

McKay, starting his business career as a \$35-a-month office boy, later became an insurance and automobile salesman, borrowed money to start his own sales agency and has built a very successful business as Chevrolet distributor at Salem. Incidentally, Bill Paige, a former Roseburg resident, is the manager of McKay's automobile agency, thus giving the candidate freedom to indulge himself in his hobby of politics.

McKay was mayor of Salem in 1933-34; was elected to the State Senate in 1935 and has served continuously through the 1947 session, except while on leave of absence during the war. He has been very active in veterans' affairs, wildlife and conservation activities and is chairman of the Willamette Valley Project Committee. He also is a member of the legislative interim committee on highways.

Glenn C. Ackerman, also a Republican candidate for governor, is a personable and successful young businessman of Portland. He is interested in social reform and is courting the support of organized labor.

A fourth Republican candidate is John Peyton, a former Roseburg realtor, whose chief ability appears to be in managing the display of his portrait in prominent places.

The Democratic party has only one candidate, State Senator Lew Wallace. No ballot would be complete without the Wallace name in some spot. He has long been an outstanding figure in state politics. A former member of the State Game Commission, he is interested in conservation of resources. He heads the legislative interim committee studying state game administration.

Dr. H. D. Sheldon, Oregon University Instructor, Dies

EUGENE, Ore., May 15.—(AP)—Dr. Henry Davidson Sheldon, one of the "grand old men" of the University of Oregon, died here yesterday following an illness of several months.

Associated with the university since 1900, Dr. Sheldon was known throughout the Northwest as a scholar, author and educator. He was especially known for his "History of the University of Oregon, 1872-1939", and was for many years dean of the school of education until the school assumed an inter-institutional status under the newly organized state system of higher education. Coming to the university in 1904 as an associate professor of education, he advanced to a full professorship in 1907, and served in that capacity until 1911, when he went to the University of Pittsburgh as professor of the history of education. He returned in 1914 to become dean of the school of education.

Dr. Sheldon was born in Salt Lake City Oct. 3, and received his B. A. and M. A. from Stanford, and his Ph. D. from Clark University in 1909. He was married to Florence V. Perry, who survives, in 1902. Also surviving are a son, Henry D. Sheldon, Jr., of Washington, D. C.; a daughter, Mrs. J. R. Ferguson of Menlo Park, Cal., and four grand-children.

THE CASE OF THE BURNED DIAMOND

A very worried lady dropped in at a Portland jeweler some time ago; she showed the jeweler a three carat diamond that had been accidentally swept into a fireplace—the flames had oxidized the surface of the stone which gave it a milky cast, ruining its appearance. In reply to her inquiry whether the stone could be salvaged the jeweler said: "This stone has been ruined. It would be impossible to use it as a gem again. I can allow you about seventy five dollars for it if you would sell it to me." She hesitated, feeling that seventy five dollars was not enough even for an industrial diamond.

Ultimately the stone was brought to Knudtson's. They repolished it and restored its lustre at a cost less than fifty dollars. Now this lady has a stone worth its true value—\$2,500. Yet it almost sold for seventy five dollars.

\$75 or \$2,500?

Whether the jeweler actually thought the stone was ruined—or whether he was attempting to take advantage of the lady's ignorance of gems we don't know. We do know that if the lady had taken the stone to a Registered Jeweler or Certified Gemologist (and there are several in Portland) she would not have risked selling a valuable diamond for a pittance.

Why The Emphasis?

Why all this emphasis on Registered Jewelers and Certified Gemologists? Simply this: Before a jeweler may become a Registered Jeweler of the American Gem Society he must pass rigid scientific examinations and his store must pass examinations. The Admission Board sees that both the jeweler and his store are, from a business standpoint, above reproach.

The proprietor or one or more of his salesmen must pass examinations, for example, on all deceptive jewelry terms, the fundamentals of gemology, factors affecting value of jewelry, gems, precious metals and silverware. The applicant must pass an examination in the grading of diamonds and all factors which might affect their value. Not only that—he and his store must pass yearly examinations. The course leading to qualification as Registered Jeweler normally requires up to four years of intensive study.

Had a Registered Jeweler or Certified Gemologist attempted to swindle or mislead the owner of the burned diamond he would have lost his membership and all rights and privileges of the society for such a practice.

An Open Organization

Nor is this a closed organization—any jeweler may become a member providing he meets the qualifications mentioned above. Because the buying public appreciates the benefits and protection from the society we believe an increasing number of jewelers will apply and eventually qualify for admission, just as architects and optometrists have formed similar organizations.
