Left-Handed Trio Of Hurlers Puts Cardinals at Top

The comeback Pollet, the consistent brilliance of Brecheen, and the remarkable relief hurling of Brazle are responsible for the St. Louis Cardinals' lofty perch in the National League pennant race.

The Redbirds were in first place today, one full game in front of the New York Giants. They have won 13 and lost seven. Of this total, Pollet, Brecheen and Brazle—best left-handed trio in the majors—have won nine and lost one.

After a slow start, Pollet has rebounded with three straight victories. He has not yet lost. He was credited with yesterday's 6-5, 10-inning victory over the Pirates for his second win in three days. Brecheen has won all of his four starts, the first three by shutouts.

His consecutive scoreless inning skein was snapped at 32 when the Pirates broke through for two runs in the sixth inning of Saturday night's game, won by the Cards, 8-3.

Brazle has appeared in four games, all in relief. The Cards won three of them with Brazle gaining credit for two.

In the only other National League game played yesterday, the Cincinnati Reds came up with two runs in the top of the 10th to outscore the Cubs in Chicago, 13-11.

Although they pounded out five home runs, the Cleveland Indians could do no better than gain a split in their doubleheader with Chicago. The White Sox won the opener, 6-4, in 10 innings and the Indians captured the nightcap, 9-2.

The fast-moving Boston Red Sox on their fifth straight by coming from behind to outslug the Washington Senators, 14-5. Houtteman went down to his fifth straight defeat as the St. Louis Browns nipped the Tigers in Detroit, 3-2, in the finale of their three-game series.

The scheduled doubleheader at Philadelphia between the New York Giants and Phillies was postponed by rain after the Phils had taken a 1-0 lead with the Giants batting in the third inning.

RHS to Battle Medford in Twin Bill Baseball

Roseburg High School will play host to the Medford Black Toros in a doubleheader baseball game, slated for 1:30 p.m. Tuesday on Kinlay Field, announced Coach George Erickson.

These will be the final games for the local Indians, and they will be out to make a showing. Roseburg has been handicapped this season by unfavorable weather conditions, which have prevented practice and resulted in the majority of the contests being rained out.

Starting the season with mostly green material and a decided lack of strength in the pitching department, Erickson has had to mold his team by the trial and error method.

Chuck Seefeld has carried the brunt of the pitching duties, but works better in an infield position. Tom Johnson and Ronnie Oilar, the other chuckers, both lack experience.

The remaining lineup will probably be the same as that which has started most other games with Bob Sanders as catcher, Glen Seefeld on first base, Webster at second, Leo Bowers on third, Stan Crummett at shortstop, Widding in left field, Jerry Coen in center field and Harold Edgar in right field.

Coen and Edgar, both lettermen, have the best hitting averages to date.

Medford has a strong team, according to advance reports, and will probably give the Indians plenty of trouble.

Medford, Henley Win State Titles At Track Meet

CORVALLIS, Ore., May 17.—

(AP)—State high school track and field championships were held today by Medford in Class A and Henley in Class B after victories in the 22nd annual meet finals Saturday.

Contestants posted three new Class A records; in the javelin, the modern half-mile and the relay.

Medford's Pear Pickers combined three first places and one second to pile up 35 points to set a pace that was unrivaled. Portland's Jefferson scored 15 points to take second place and Washington of Portland was close behind for third place with 14 points.

Henley successfully defended its Class "B" crown by totaling 34 points. Siuslaw was second with 27 and Mohawk third with 22.

Individual honors were awarded Dick Riggs, Medford ace, and Merlin Rodman, Madras ace. Riggs placed first in the 100-yard sprint and the 440-yard event and ran in the winning relay team to post 114 points in the Class A competition. Rodman scored 15 1/5 of Madras' 18 points.

The new javeline mark was made by Chuck Misset of Milwaukie. He tossed the spear 211 feet, 1 inch to shatter a 17-year old record. The earlier mark was posted by Warren Demaris of Prineville at 201 feet, 5 1/2 inches in 1931.

Medford's relay team sliced a tenth of a second from the 15-year old mark set by Washington in 1933 and tied last year by Grants Pass. The new record is 1:31.2 minutes. It was set by Riggs, Worthen, Shangle and Timmons.

The modern half-mile record was set at 2 minutes 4/10 seconds by Floyd Jepson of Portland's Benson. Backlund of Roseburg was second. It was two-tenths of a second better than the time of Medford's Werner last year.

Class A competition saw 32 teams collect points.
