National Forest Timber for Sale

Oral auction bids will be received by the Regional Forester or his authorized representative at the office of the Forest Supervisor, Post Office Building, Roseburg, Oregon, beginning at 2:00 p.m., June 17, 1948, for all the live timber marked or designated for cutting, and all merchantable dead timber located on an area embracing about 610 acres within sections 27, 34 and 35 T26S, R1W, sections 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 9 and 10, T27S, R1W, WM, surveyed, Umpqua National Forest, Oregon, estimated to be 39,567,000 feet B.M., more or less of Douglas-fir, 7,702,000 feet B.M., more or less of Western hemlock, 1,388,000 feet B.M., more or less of White fir, 301,000 feet B.M., more or less of Western white pine and 458,000 feet B.M., more or less of Western redcedar and an unestimated amount of sugar pine and other species of sawtimber and Western redcedar poles. Sealed bids accompanied

by required payment received by the Forest Supervisor prior to 2:00 p.m., June 17, 1948, will be considered the equivalent of an oral bid and posted for the information of all bidders. The appraised value of the timber according to long-term, normal market and operating conditions is \$6.50 per M feet for Douglas-fir, \$9.55 per M feet for Western white pine, \$9.55 per M feet for sugar pine, \$1.10 per M feet for White fir, \$2.25 per M feet for Western redcedar, \$1.10 per M feet for Western hemlock and other species of sawtimber, and \$0.035 per lineal foot for Western redcedar poles. No bid will be considered which is less than these rates as a base rate applicable through the entire period of the sale agreement, plus at least \$7.70 per M feet for Douglas-fir, \$9.45 per M feet for Western white pine, \$9.45 per M feet for sugar pine, \$1.60 per M feet for White fir, \$4.85 per M feet for Western redcedar and \$1.60 per M feet for Western hemlock and other species of sawtimber, the total to apply for all timber cut prior to June 1, 1950. On that date and at other times, as stated in the contract, total rates will be redetermined, but in no event will the redetermined stumpage rates be less than the basic appraised value as first above stated, and in no event will rates below those bid be established until at least 12,000,000 feet B.M. have been cut and paid for at not less than the bid rates. In addition to the prices bid for stumpage a cooperative deposit of \$0.05 per M feet B.M., to be used by the Forest Service for partially paying the cost of slash disposal and a cooperative deposit of \$0.25 per M feet B.M., to cover the cost of tree planting, seed sowing and timber stand improvement work on the area cut over, for the total cut of sawtimber under the terms of the agreement, will be required. \$20,000.00 to be applied on the purchase price, refunded, or retained in part as liquidated damages, according to the conditions of sale, must accompany each sealed bid, and must be shown to be in the possession of the Forest Supervisor.

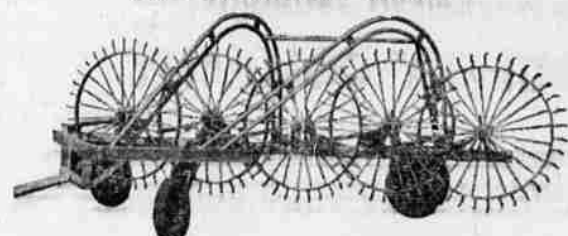
