

Phantom Defeats Jones; Hessel Wins Over Kiser

In a bruising, bloody, nothing-barred battle of two falls that occupied a total of only 15 minutes, The Phantom defeated Rufus Jones, Negro head-butt specialist, in the headliner of Saturday night's wrestling bill at the Armory. Rufus got the first fall in 10 minutes with a Boston crab hold after felling his opponent with a series of head-butts, and battling him at one period off the mat in front of first-row spectators. The second round lasted only half as long, but it was more fiercely fought and brought an end to the combat.

With the Phantom meeting Jones on his own terms—head-butting, mauling and kicking—the pair in the final stanza twice carried the battle off the mat, and on the second occasion one of Jones' feet became tangled in the ropes, suspending him head down over the edge of the ring. That was the beginning of the end, which came amid a scene of wild confusion among the spectators, many of whom surged to the ringside for a close-up eyeful of the finish.

One spectator leaped into the ring and freed Jones' trapped foot, but before the Negro had been butted into bloody submission by his equally gory opponent. Referee Jimmy Maloney, who appeared almost impotent during the melee, rolled Jones back onto the mat, but the Negro lay inert on the canvas, for the full count of 20, automatically giving the fall to the Phantom, and had to be carried to the dressing room on the referee's shoulders. Jones failed to appear for the scheduled third fall, so the verdict in the match went to the Phantom.

The spectators totaled around 1,000. Hessel Beats Kiser. The semi-final between Gordon Hessel and Jack Kiser was strictly of the orthodox type, with the men shaking hands after each of the three falls. Hessel won the first fall in 20:57 with a trigger hold, and the third and deciding one in 9 minutes with his reverse flying head scissors. Kiser annexed the second fall in 15 minutes with a body slam and press after weakening his opponent with a series of punishing hammerlocks.

Referee Maloney had practically nothing to do during the battle but listen to complaints from some of the crowd who thought he was too slow starting the counts on apparent shoulder pins.

Rainers' Barrett Beats Sacramento On 0-0 Mound Job

By The Associated Press. Dick Barrett had to reach the ripe baseball age of 40 and serve 23 seasons on the diamond before he achieved pithy immortality. Barrett yesterday pitched a perfect game as his Seattle Rainers downed Sacramento in the second game of a Pacific Coast League doubleheader, 3-0.

Barrett didn't allow a hit. Not a single Sacramento player reached first base. He fanned five and only once during the contest did he let the count get to three-and-two. It was Kewpie's 20th victory in the Coast League, his 195th in Seattle livery. He started the three-run rally in the third inning with a single, too.

Seattle also took the first game of the twin bill when Sacramento shortstop Wells fumbled the ball with the bases loaded in the last of the ninth. Seattle won by an 8-7 margin.

Etten Swats Four Homers. Etten was just about the whole show in Los Angeles as Oakland and the Angels divided a double bill. Los Angeles took the first, 8 to 5. Etten slammed four home runs during the afternoon, three in the second contest that went to the Oaks, 10 to 3. One of these was a grand slam drive.

Gilbert's companions said he was the only one of the group who could not swim. The boy, a junior in school and a halfback who was to have been a captain of next fall's football team, went under at once.

Others, also here for the track meet, who were on the canoeing trip, were Bill Powell, Harold Jensen, Don Burgraff, and Gary Miller.

Powell, a sprinter, was the only one of the group entered in the finals of the meet Saturday. He qualified in the 220-yard dash Friday.

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Drunkometers' Will Test Arrested Drivers. SEATTLE — (AP) — Chief George D. Eastman says the Seattle police department will stiffen its speed control program by using "drunkometers" and photographs to determine intoxication of motorists.

Eastman said photographs will be taken of drunken drivers at time of their arrest, "to show the appearance of their faces, posture and actions." The drunkometers are devices to indicate the alcoholic content of a person's blood.

The police chief said these steps, plus stricter enforcement of speed limits, were planned because of an increase in speeding.

The poultry business, (eggs and chickens) brought Oregon farmers nearly \$23 million dollars last year. In addition, turkeys brought in more than \$12 million more. That is a lot of money, and a very comfortable part of it represents profit to producers. In addition producers ate in their own homes over five and a half million dollars worth of chickens, eggs and turkeys.

We hear considerable complaint about high priced feed. We know it is justified. But there is still money in eggs. According to USDA figures, Oregon hens averaged 177 eggs last year. Therefore, even if your hens were only average, your income from eggs, (sold or used), was \$8.04 (14¢ dozen eggs at 54¢ per dozen. Remember, these figures are from the Government).

Figuring that you fed liberally, your hen could hardly have eaten more than a hundred pounds of feed. (The average feed consumption in California official egg contests for three years was only 94.1 pounds per bird, and they weigh every ounce).
