U. S. Cold to Stalin's Peace Parley Offer

American government cannot negotiate with Russia any of the great world issues in which other nations such as Britain and France are equally interested. The other point of today's statement—that Russia is to blame for the stalemate in world affairs because Russia is in a minority on all major issues—likewise is the position the United States took in response of the exchange published last week between Molotov and American Ambassador Smith.

Soviet Trick Suspected The nature of Stalin's proposals for discussions with the United States gave support to American officials' suspicions that Russia is pressing a "peace offensive" for diplomatic and propaganda advantage.

Since V-E day the United States and Russia have been at odds on almost every one of the issues Stalin listed in endorsing Henry Wallace's "open letter" of May 11 as a "concrete program" for possible settlement of differences. There was no immediate hint whether the United States would reply at all—and if so what the nature of the response might be. Both the White House and the State Department were silent.

No reply necessarily is called for. Stalin's proposals were not made in a statement broadcast by the Moscow radio in reply to an American political candidate's campaign statement. That candidate, Wallace, has long been at odds with the administration over foreign policy.

The administration is already on record as to what the Russians can do if they seriously want to work for peace in the world.

Secretary of State Marshall stated it May 12 in his sum-up of the situation after Molotov announced readiness to accept an offer he said Ambassador Walter Bedell Smith had made to negotiate.

Marshall said the United States has not offered to enter into any two-power talks with Russia for a settlement of problems also concerning other nations. If the Russians are serious, he said, they can act through the United Nations and other international agencies. Marshall added: "What we want is action in the fields where action is possible and urgently necessary at the present time."

Interment will follow in Civil Bend Cemetery.

Jaycees Bidden To Nominate to Fill Park Board Seat

An invitation to the Roseburg Junior Chamber of Commerce to nominate four members of that organization to an impending vacancy on the City Park Commission was extended by Mayor Albert G. Flegel at the Chamber of Commerce forum luncheon Monday.

The invitation was directed to Don Forbers, former president of the Roseburg Jaycees, who told of the work of his organization and said that many leaders in civic affairs had gone through the ranks of the Junior Chamber as "younger men."

He pointed out that the organization here had contributed much toward civic betterment. He cited the cross on Mt. Nebo, which shines at Christmas and Easter each year; the annual children's Halloween parade, and the Junior First Citizen banquet.

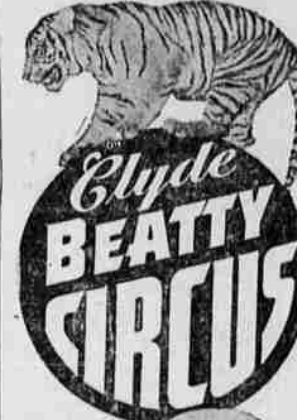
Membership in the organization is limited to those between the ages of 21 and 35, he said. Mayor Flegel, denying that he is "old" himself, said that after he came into office, he had appointed persons to civic positions who were aged 40 and 41 to represent the "younger element." As he listened to Forbers' speech, he had the idea of appointing a new member to the City Park Commission between the ages of 21 and 35.

If the Roseburg Junior Chamber of Commerce would nominate four of its members for the forthcoming vacancy, he would ask that the new appointee pledge himself to resign at the age of 35 to permit a younger man to assume the duties.

A favorable reaction was expressed at the meeting to the mayor's proposal. However, an agreement by a Jaycee appointee to resign from the City Park Commission at the age of 35 would have no legal force, the mayor pointed out.
