

Grants Pass Men Lead in Doubles At Bowling Tourney

Tabulation of the first phase of the Southern Oregon Classified Bowling Tournament staged over the weekend at the Roseburg Bowling Alley revealed R. Peden and T. Suter of Grants Pass leading in Class A doubles with a score of 1007.

A. Zenor and Jim Winland, also of Grants Pass, were in second place with 1052. A. Mentzer, Roseburg, is leading in Class A singles with a score of 537, and A. Zenor, Grants Pass, is second with 521.

The Variety Bakery, Corvallis, is leading in the Class B team event with a total of 2521. Meadowland Creamery, also of Corvallis, is trailing in second place with a 2502 score.

In Class B singles P. Culver, Seaside, is first with 578. Second place is held by C. Jackson, also of Seaside, with a count of 555, and third place by C. Warren, Roseburg, 549.

Class B doubles leaders are K. Bushey and C. Warren, Roseburg, with a 1096 score. V. Starr and D. Kennedy, Corvallis, and M. Ketish and R. Matthews, also of Corvallis, are tied for second place with a tally of 1055.

The first place Class C team event is held by the Elks Club, Roseburg, whose score is 2386. Second place is held by Myrtle Creek with a 2359 tally.

Class C doubles first place is held by Ted Travis and Frank Bistak, Roseburg, score 1086. Second place is held by H. Bergstrom and B. Curtis, Ashland, 976.

Holding first place in Class C singles is N. Bergstrom, Ashland, 544; second place, T. Ditcher, Seaside, 518, and F. Anderson, Roseburg, 503.

All events title contenders are: Class A, E. Reitman, Corvallis, 1586; Class B, R. Matthews, Corvallis, 1650, and Class C, F. Bistak, Roseburg, 1477.

The tourney will resume next Saturday night and continue through Sunday, with a larger number of Class A teams entered.

Boston Braves Top National League In Solid Performance

(Associated Press Sports Writer) They may rave about the wonderful St. Louis Cardinal pitching staff. They may gape in awe at the New York Giants' devastating power. They may admire and envy Brooklyn's depth with its youth and speed. The solid team in the National League, however, is the Boston Braves.

Boston is not in first place. The Cards hold that spot and the Giants are second. The Braves are third, but only because they got off to a miserable start. They dropped six of their first seven games.

Since then Boston has won 11 and lost four, the best record by far, in the circuit for the period. Billy Southworth's men haven't lost since May 9.

They open a 14-game home

stand tonight, boasting the league's No. 1 pitcher in Bill Voiselle, No. 2 batter in Tommy Holmes, the best fielding percentage of any club in the circuit and a four-game winning streak.

The Braves ended a successful road trip last night by crushing the Dodgers in Brooklyn, 12-3. It marked their fourth straight win over Brooklyn without a setback.

It also gave them a record of eight victories in 11 road games. No team in the league—and that includes the Cardinals—boasts three front line hurlers such as Boston's Johnny Sain, Warren Spahn and Voiselle. This trio has given up only three runs in Boston's last four games.

Another hot club, the Philadelphia Phillies, defeated the New York Giants 7-1. The victory moved the Phils up to fourth place, only three percentage points behind the Braves.

Blatnik paced the Phils' 10-hit attack against Newsum and three successors. The rookie outfielder, picked up in the draft last fall, cracked three hits in four times up to wrest the league's batting leadership from Boston's Tommy Holmes with .438 to .435. He has hit safely in nine consecutive games.

Those were the only games scheduled in the majors.

The six-round semi-final will match Bob Naezelrod, Roseburg, against Chris Holmes, Salem, in the 144-pound class. Two four-round preliminaries are also billed.

Tickets are now on sale in Roseburg at J. V. Sporting Goods, Grand Cafe and Wally's Pastime, and in Sutherland at The Pastime, according to promoters Bill Olsen and Rudy Schlotthauer.

Early Detection, Treatment Best To Combat Cancer

NEW YORK. (AP)—Cancer kills slightly more women than it does men.

But the women are taking a far greater proportionate interest in the best way yet found to cut down cancer deaths—early detection and treatment.

A large share of the American Cancer Society's \$12,000,000 budget last year went for the establishment of clinics and the distribution of factual information on the disease that kills one person every three minutes in this country.

Since last September some 135,000 requests have been received at the society's national headquarters here for information on cancer and its seven danger signals.

"About 85 per cent come from women," said Russell G. Smith, "and the question they ask most often is where can they obtain an examination."

The requests are relayed to medical chairmen in each state, who direct them to the nearest detection center. The society has 200 of these centers and is adding more.

A common source of disappointment to many seeking to check whether they have cancer is the time required for examination. The disease, particularly when it attacks internal organs, is often difficult to diagnose. Yet it is this

type which causes most deaths. Ninety per cent of skin cancers are regarded as curable if treated early.

Many of the letters are touching in their simple pleas for help or their sublime bravery.

"My throat seems like it is full of something," wrote one uneducated man. "Make me want to hark it out but I can't hark it out. And at night it seems to want to strangle me in my sleep. I want to no if you can give me something to clear up my throat."

Another elderly man, told by his doctor he was beyond cure, sent in a contribution toward further research with the simple wish "It may help a luckier fellow."

Daily letters come giving suggestions on the cause and cure of the disease on which scientists have been working for centuries.

Two girls, 11 and 12, wrote: "We believe that the organism breeds in coal mines and is carried to the people by the miners and on coal dust."

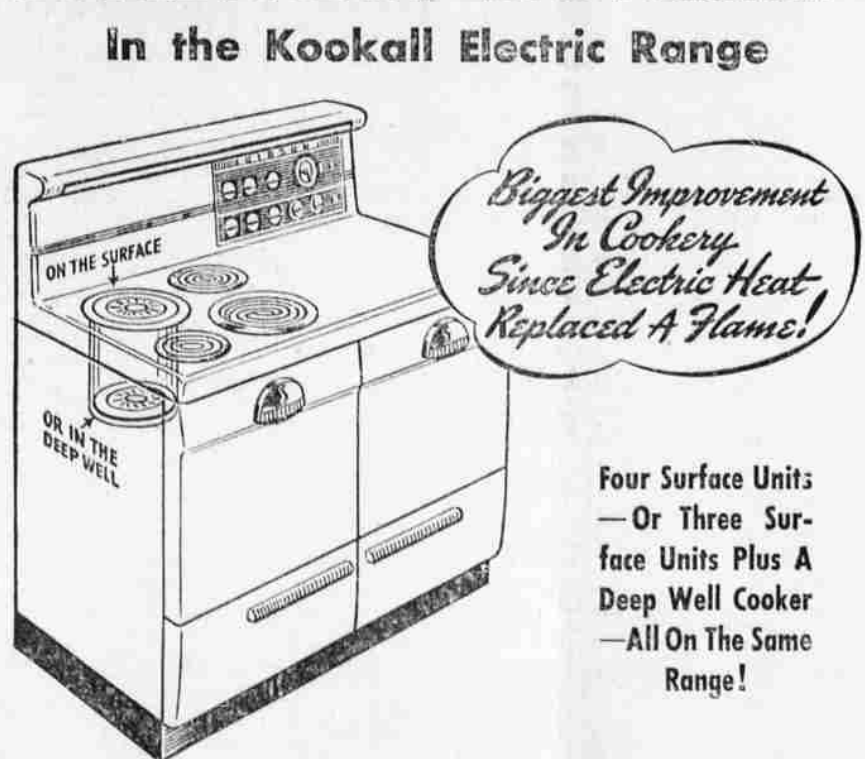

hope, it points out that the disease is merely the uncontrolled growth of cells or body tissues, and says:

"There is no salve, ointment, radium water, mineral water, liquid medicine, pill, indian charm or needle injection that has ever cured a proved case of internal cancer."

"Surgery, x-ray and radium, alone or in combination, when used by recognized men of medicine are the only effective methods of treating cancer at present."

"I had an unusual dream which may turn out to be a help to mankind. I dreamt that the serum from the milkweed was a cure for cancer." Another was sure sheep sorrel weed would help.

One man suggested cures could be obtained by draining out all the afflicted persons blood and replacing it with new blood. Another said he heard of a cancer being cured by tying a live toad on it. The cancer, he said, dissolved the toad—and the toad dissolved the cancer. Still another recommended drinking the blood of a strange Brazilian animal immune to poison. He didn't mention the name of the animal.

These "remedies" are generally all old wives' tales to cancer researchers, exploded long ago. But the suggestions are passed on to medical authorities for what they are worth.

Quackery Exploded The society emphasizes that cancer isn't due to a germ, isn't inherited and isn't contagious or communicable. Warning against quacks who victimize cancer victims who grasp at any straw of

The trio gradually had raised the amount of their bets to \$25 on each spin but late yesterday reduced it to \$5. Walford said the change was "part of our system."

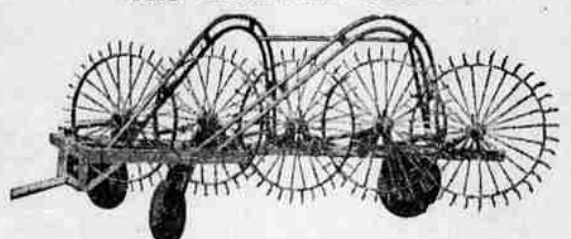
