Tax Cut Advocated
Stassen also advocated reduction in taxes "on small and new businesses." The present combination of taxes, he said, makes impossible the expansion of small businesses. To permit small business to "grow and compete with bigger business and to be a part of a vigorous, modern people's capitalism in America" is one of the "best safeguards against depression."

The Minnesota also urged the revision of Western freight rates and improvement of transportation facilities to contribute to the growth of "this vast and productive area and aid in the marketing of its products."

He also urged a long-term farm program assuring to agriculture a "fair share of the national income in exchange for the uncontrolled production of an abundant supply of food."

Stassen spoke of the "combination of opposition" that "has directed its full force on this Oregon primary," and declared that Senator Taft is a member of that opposition. Political observers said it was the first time the Minnesota candidate has publicly declared his belief in reports that a "stop Stassen" movement is coming from other presidential camps. He said it formed after the Nebraska primary and has reached its peak in Oregon.

Rain Ignored
The presidential aspirant was welcomed on his arrival here by members of the Citizens for Stassen organization. His chartered bus was brought to the front entrance of the Umpqua Hotel shortly after 7 yesterday evening. He retired to his room for dinner before proceeding to the Armory.

Despite a drizzle or rain, Stassen walked to the Armory behind the escorting Knights of Pythias Girls Drum Corps. He was accompanied by Mayor Albert G. Flegel and Harry O. Pargeter, chairman of the Douglas County Republican Central Committee.

As Stassen was about to be introduced to his audience at the Armory, the auditorium was plunged into momentary darkness. The 10-second power black-out affected a large part of the city. No explanation was immediately available.

The first half-hour of Stassen's speech was transcribed. Lyle Fenner, KRNR announcer, presented Pargeter, who introduced Mayor Flegel, who in turn introduced Stassen. It was the second occasion for Roseburg's Democratic mayor to introduce a Republican presidential hopeful. He previously introduced Governor Dewey. After his speech at the Armory, Stassen and his party were guests at a reception in the Umpqua Hotel Civic Room, which had been arranged by the Citizens for Stassen group. At the Armory and at the hotel, the former Minnesota governor paused to shake hands with many persons.

Scots Rap British Royal Pair for Sunday Gaity
EDINBURGH, Scotland, May 19.—(AP)—Scottish churchmen declared today that Princess Elizabeth and Prince Philip set a regrettable example for the young by attending horse races, a theater and a night club last Sunday in Paris.

The Scottish Association of the Lord's Day Observance Society sent Prime Minister Attlee this telegram: "We feel constrained to express our profound regret that the itinerary arranged for their royal highnesses, Princess Elizabeth and the Duke of Edinburgh (Prince Philip), while on their official visit to Paris, included attendance at racing, theater and night club dancing during the Lord's day."

"This is contrary to the best traditions of the British people."

Truman Moves to Ban Telephone Union Strike
WASHINGTON, May 19.—(AP)—President Truman yesterday created a special board of inquiry to investigate the threatened strike of long lines telephone workers.

The President signed an executive order creating the board under the Taft-Hartley Act. The dispute involves certain employees of the American Telephone and Telegraph Company (long lines division) represented by the CIO American Union of Telephone Workers.

Mr. Truman said the dispute "threatens to result in a work stoppage imperiling national health and safety." Creation of the board of inquiry is the first step in dealing with a strike threat under the Taft-Hartley Act. The board was directed to report to the President no later than June 8.

Yugoslavia and Nicaragua recognized the new Jewish State of Israel, making a total of seven nations. Great Britain, which has not, said she will continue giving financial aid and military equipment to the Trans-Jordan Arab Legion and other Arab states.

Unless and until the United Nations finds these countries have been acting illegally in Palestine, the U. N. was reported veering away from an American proposal to use an international force to end the war in Palestine.

Tel Aviv was under air raid alert until well after midnight. Attacks yesterday were the worst yet. The central bus station received a direct hit.

The Syrian army said it had occupied Samakh at the base of the Sea of Galilee and found 172 enemy bodies. A Jewish plane was reported downed over Iraq lines.

past year, and an adjustment in the street department after July 1 is planned, he said. Starkard praised the city council as a good conservative group. He said the budget committee actually raised the itemized amounts, when the members were shown that the millage figure would be lower than that of last year, even though the total budget is higher.

The proposed budget total is listed at \$217,672, compared with \$162,680 for last year, but the increased revenue would reduce the millage levy from 20 mills to 16.9 mills, if the budget as set up is approved, he pointed out.

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The petition also was filed with the Baltimore regional office of NLRB. A similar complaint against Lewis by the southern group already is pending there. That grew out of dispute over miners' pensions.

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He said that Lewis "objects to any organized opposition."

Charles O'Neill, spokesman for the mine owners, said after the breakup he thought the situation is "serious."

"Whether this will drift into a strike I do not know," O'Neill told a news conference. He added: "What the government will do about it, I do not know."

"The consequences cannot be guessed. The union left. There is no conference. All negotiations for a contract at this point are stopped. Unless there is a change in positions there will be no negotiations."

O'Neill contended Moody "was here as a proper representative" of operators whose mines produce about 150,000,000 tons of coal yearly.

George Love, Pittsburgh operator, also told the news conference that employers have the legal right to bargain through representatives of their own choosing.

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Lewis said then that the southern groups which make up the Southern Coal Producers Association were not complying with their contract when they did not appear at the conference as individuals to bargain for a new agreement.

The union's present wage agreement expires June 30. Traditionally, the miners have refused to work without a contract.

While Lewis yesterday did not make a direct threat of a strike because of what he called a breach of contract, that possibility existed nevertheless. His call for a meeting of the UMW's 200-man policy committee tomorrow indicated he has some move in mind.

NOTICE OF INTENTION TO CONSTRUCT SEWER LINE ON EAST SEVENTH STREET, AVENUE "A," EAST THIRD AVENUE, NORTH AND AVENUE "B," CITY OF ROSEBURG, OREGON.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that at a meeting of the Common Council of the City of Roseburg, Oregon, held May 3, 1948, the following resolution was adopted:

RESOLVED, that the Common Council of the City of Roseburg, Oregon, deem it expedient and necessary to construct a sewer on East Seventh Street from the intersection of East Second Avenue North and East Seventh Street to the intersection of Avenue "B" with branches of lateral as follows:

Along Avenue "A" from East Seventh Street to a point approximately ten feet West of the Western boundary of East Fifth Street along East Third Avenue North from East Seventh Street to a point approximately ten feet West of the Western boundary of East Sixth Street along Avenue "B" from East Seventh Street to a point approximately ten feet West of the Western boundary of East Sixth Street in the following manner:

First: By excavating a trench to proper subgrade in which to install sewer pipe, and of sufficient width to permit proper installation and inspection.

Second: By tunneling under existing pavement, if necessary.

Third: By laying and installing approximately 1365 lineal feet of six-inch and approximately 225 lineal feet of eight-inch vitrified clay or concrete sewer pipe.

Fourth: By laying and installing approximately 35 vitrified clay sewer pipe.

Fifth: By constructing seven concrete manholes with cast iron covers.

Sixth: By back-filling with earth or other suitable material.

Said improvements are to be made in accordance with the charter and ordinances of the City of Roseburg, Oregon, and the grade, plans, specifications and estimates of the City Engineer filed in the office of the City Recorder on the 15th day of April, 1948, which said grade, plans and specifications and estimates are hereby approved and adopted.

The entire cost of the constructing of said sewer, including engineering, interest and all other expenses which the City of Roseburg would not have incurred except from the construction of said sewer shall be levied upon the property especially benefited thereby as provided by the charter of the City of Roseburg, Oregon, and in accordance with the petition of property owners to be benefited by said sewer, and no part thereof shall be paid by the City of Roseburg.

The estimate of the City Engineer of the probable detail cost of the construction and installation of said sewer is the sum of Eight Thousand Six Hundred Seven and 50/100 Dollars (\$8607.50). If concrete sewer pipe is used, or Eight Thousand Nine Hundred and 75/100 Dollars (\$8907.75) if vitrified clay pipe is used.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the City Recorder be, and she is hereby directed to give notice of the intention to construct and install said sewer as provided by the charter of the City of Roseburg, Oregon.

Remonstrances against the construction and installation of said sewer may be filed in writing with the undersigned within twenty (20) days from the first publication of this notice, which first publication is the 8th day of May, 1948.
