thought occurs: "Uncle Joe wouldn't be just trying to GET RID OF THE ATOM BOMB FIRST, would he?"

ONE trouble with this propaganda-ridden world is that we can't take things for granted. There is the case of the U. S. Army sergeant (stationed at the American embassy in Moscow) who seems to have gone Russian in a big way.

"Living in the United States, I did not think there existed a system of government such as exists here in the Soviet Union. In which the common man is looked after and which is directed toward constant improvement of the mode of life and the culture of the people."

He wrote the letter, he explains, "as a protest against the anti-Soviet policies of the capitalists who at present rule America."

OUR State Department did a little investigating. As a result of its inquiries, it announces in Washington that the sergeant had been "seduced and exploited by an experienced Soviet woman agent."

It identifies the agent as Mrs. Galina Dunueva Bionish, and adds that she is the wife of another American sergeant and that her wifely conduct has been such that her husband is instituting separation proceedings.

A couple of former Moscow buddies of the sergeant who wrote the letter report in Washington that the boy (he is 21) has been made a victim of a standard Soviet practice of "using fascinating women to entice and lead astray impressionable Americans stationed at our embassy in Moscow."

THIS business of statecraft, you see, is quite a business. It stops at nothing in the pinches.

This is an important point to remember about it: When too much power is held in too few hands too long, there is practically nothing that those who hold the power won't do to KEEP IT.

Russia is that the power of life and death over 180 million Russians is held in the hands of a FEW MEN in Moscow.

That is basically why it is so hard for us to get along with Russia. If it were merely a case of getting along with the Russian PEOPLE, it would be simple and easy.

Last night's crowd saw Feller retire the side in seven of the nine innings while the home club routed Dietrich in a five-run fifth.
