

Stassen Hurls Claim Of Dewey-Taft Coalition

the ridiculous sum he mentions and he knows it."

The Minnesota reference to a supposed join-up of Dewey and Senator Robert A. Taft of Ohio was labeled "unfounded and false."

Stassen Forces Hit Back

Stassen forces replied last night through Stassen headquarters here with the statement:

"We are willing to rely upon the good common sense of the people of Oregon to decide whether or not the amount of eastern money and the number of New York State employees, from the superintendent of banking on down, which are being poured into Oregon in this 'Stop Stassen' campaign, are out of proportion to an honest appeal for their votes."

Stassen's original charge, made at Astoria, stated:

"Obviously, the 12 Oregon votes to the national convention are not the cause of this huge expenditure."

"This eastern combination of Taft-Dewey forces has been making a desperate attempt through this Oregon primary to stop our nation-wide public support."

Dewey's answer said "It is sad to see that Mr. Stassen in the final days should degrade the campaign by such reckless and flagrantly untruthful statements."

"I have come to know the people of Oregon and I know they will resent and repudiate these desperate, irresponsible eleven-hour tactics."

Oregonians had first-hand evidence on billboards, in newspapers, and over the radio that both sides were running up campaign bills. But heretofore the highest campaign expenditure in Oregon has been the \$60,000 reported in the 1944 senatorial race.

More than 300,000 Republicans are registered to vote in tomorrow's polls—and the total registration of around 630,000 is the highest in Oregon's history.

A heavy turn-out was a foregone conclusion, with predictions for 65 to 70 percent among the Republicans.

Today—the last day of the campaign—found Stassen in a driving finish around Portland to be caught by an old-fashioned torch-light parade through the streets of Portland tonight.

Dewey was taking it a little easier. He scheduled a visit to the Shrine hospital this morning and conferences the rest of the day here.

Both candidates were to make final pleas over state-wide radio networks today and tonight.

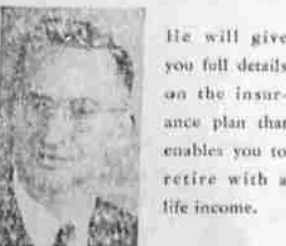

Packery Strike Riot Draws National Guard

In hour wage hike on March 16. The companies, Armour, Cudahy, Swift, Wilson and a few smaller concerns, have offered the CIO a nine-cent boost, the same amount accepted by an AFL union in the industry without a strike.

The automobile industry, where a strike has already halted production of one of the big three manufacturers, watched General Motors' negotiations with two CIO unions of 265,000 workers. Ninety thousand workers are idle because of the Chrysler strike. The CIO Automobile and Electrical Workers Unions are planning to strike at GM if a new contract is not negotiated.

The UAW has asked for 25 cents more an hour. The UEW

has not announced its exact demands.

In Washington, some soft coal operators met privately to discuss possible resumption of contract talks with John L. Lewis, United Mine Workers president. Formal negotiations collapsed yesterday in a dispute over the seating of Joseph E. Moody, president of the Southern Coal Producers Association.

Officials of Local 16 of the AFL Chicago Typographical Union returned a "final" contract proposed by Chicago's five major daily newspapers, and said they would seek further negotiations. However, the publishers said they have nothing more to offer.

The proposal was given to the striking printers May 12.

The final offer, the publishers said, included a wage raise of \$9 weekly and "at least eight additional concessions beyond their original offer."

Dues Paying to School Boards Assn. Ruled Out

SALEM, May 20.—(AP)—School boards do not have authority to pay dues to the Oregon School

Boards Association, attorney general Neuner ruled today.

The association's dues amount to \$5 per year plus 10 cents for each child in the district, or a maximum of \$2,005 a year for any district.

Neuner said that if the school boards want to pay the dues, they will have to get the legislature's permission.



SOCE President Will Address Reedsport Grads

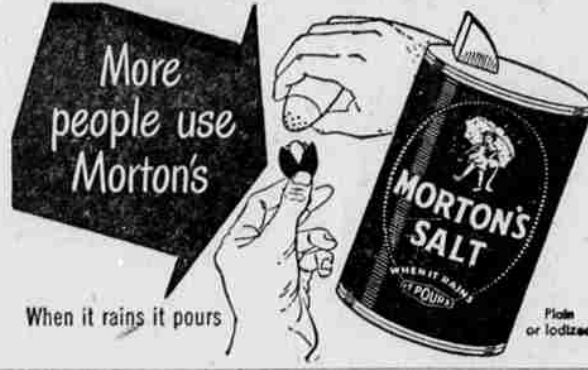
Dr. Elmo H. Stevenson, president of the Southern Oregon College of Education at Ashland, is listed as a commencement
