

Northwest Has Variety Of Weather

(By The Associated Press)

A cloudburst, flash floods, tornado funnel and a wave of warm weather gave Pacific Northwest residents a liberal sprinkling of the "unusual" yesterday.

The good part—the warm weather—will be repeated today, the weather bureau said.

While many Oregon and Washington cities racked up new high temperatures for the year, central Washington was experiencing some of mother nature's freaks.

A sudden cloudburst at Rock Island sent a stream of water over a 500-foot cliff and buried the Great Northern railroad tracks and state highway No. 10 under 15 feet of mud and rocks.

Yakima Valley residents watched for 20 minutes as a tornado funnel spun harmlessly overhead.

Both highway and railroad tracks were cleared for traffic late last night, spokesman said. The Great Northern's eastbound streamliner was delayed at Wenatchee more than two hours while

line crews repaired 100 feet of track that had been torn out or buried.

Weather bureau officials said the Yakima tornado was the first ever observed in the valley. The bottom of the funnel never came closer to the ground than 2,500 feet.

Portland was the northwest's "hot" spot with a 78-degree reading. Yakima and Omak headed the Washington list with 77s.

Hopeful, but not overly optimistic, the bureau forecaster said "it looks like it will continue for a few days."

SEATTLE, May 21.—(AP)—The national council of the Boy Scouts of America ended last night with Silver Buffalo awards to seven men, including composer Irving Berlin and Lord Rowallan, chief scout of the British Commonwealth and empire.

The award is made annually for distinguished service to boyhood of a national or international character.

Others who received the award were Belmont Browne, artist and explorer of Ross, Calif.; Cherry L. Emerson, dean of engineering at Georgia Tech., Atlanta, Ga.; R. B. Hale, San Francisco merchant; Robert F. Payne, New York educator, and Wade W. Thayer, Honolulu attorney.

Amory Houghton, national Boy Scout president, announced resignation of Reginald B. Parsons, Seattle, as a national vice-president and member of the national executive board. Kenneth K. Betchel, San Francisco, and Alton F. Baker, Eugene, Ore., publisher, were elected to replace Parsons as vice-president and board member, respectively.

Mrs. H. DeBernardi Glide Resident, Claimed by Death

Mrs. Hilda DeBernardi, 74, widow of the late Golia DeBernardi and resident of Glide for the past 28 years, died suddenly this morning at her home. She was born in Lodono, Switzerland, Nov. 22, 1873, and came to the United States in 1897.

She was married at San Francisco to Golia G. DeBernardi on Feb. 21, 1897, moving then to Crescent City, Calif., where they made their home until 1920, when they moved to Glide to settle. Mr. DeBernardi passed away in 1942. Mrs. DeBernardi was a life-long member of the Catholic church.

She is survived by four sons and one daughter, Albert DeBernardi and Joe DeBernardi, both of Glide; Horace DeBernardi, Roseburg; Virgil DeBernardi, Arcata, Calif.; and Mrs. Jack Moutgomery, Portland. She is also survived by a brother, Cirillo Tunzi, Greenfield, Calif.; a sister, Gilda Tunzi, Lodono, Switzerland, and seven grandchildren and two great-grandchildren.

Funeral services will be held in St. Joseph's Catholic church, where requiem mass will be offered at 9 o'clock Monday morning. Interment will follow in the Catholic Cemetery. Recitation of the Rosary will be at the chapel of the Long & Orr Mortuary Sunday evening at 8 o'clock.

from the north side of the Mea Shearim quarter, including central prison, the law courts, the

Russian cathedral and the Abyssinian church.

Jews Face Hard Blow

The loss of Jerusalem would be a serious blow to the Jews. Defense forces were estimated by the Arabs to number 8,000, a considerable chunk of the Army of Israel, estimated at about 50,000. Besides, 90,000 Jewish civilians are in the city, which stands as a great road block on the main Arab east-west and north-south supply lines.

Jewish planes attacked the Arabs in the Gaza coastal area south of Tel Aviv and at Shufat, north of Jerusalem. Egyptian planes landed in Aviv four times yesterday and the Jews indignantly said four British Spitfire fighters flew over the capital during one of the attacks. The Jews bombed Samakh, south of the Sea of Galilee, yesterday.

LAKE SUCCESS, May 21.—(AP)—The American-French-Belgian Consular Truce Commission reported from Jerusalem today that nothing short of United Nations force could stop fighting in the Holy City.

The consuls, apparently hopeless of achieving a truce, said the only effective measure to bring about peace in Jerusalem is employment of a neutral force able to impose its will on the warring Jews and Arabs.

Besides recommending that the council consider assignment of forces to Palestine, the commission appealed for a group of military observers to help in its task.

Egypt immediately objected that the truce commission had exceeded its authority by calling for force.

Council debate on Palestine resumed as Count Folke Bernadotte, 53-year-old head of the Swedish Red Cross, took the arduous task of trying to mediate Jewish-Arab differences on the spot.

The count was picked by the Big Five powers. In Stockholm today he was preparing to leave for Palestine at an early date to try for what he said may be the one chance in a hundred for peace.

Lewis Urged To Parley

In Washington, John L. Lewis was asked by the soft coal operators to resume contract negotiations which broke down Wednesday. The United Mine Workers president did not immediately reply. The operators had told Lewis it was a "mistake" for him to insist on excluding southern producers from the contract negotiations. The present one-year contract expires June 30.

Officials of the International Harvester Company and the CIO Farm Equipment Union signed an agreement in Chicago to extend contracts to June 28. The working agreements cover 40,000 employees in 12 plants.

The union, under terms of the Taft-Hartley Act, had taken all procedure necessary to call a strike.

In Peoria, Ill., the CIO United Auto Workers, elected bargaining agent for the Caterpillar Tractor Co., at a special runoff NLRB election yesterday and planned to open wage negotiations today.
