Subsistence For Farm-Training Vets Increased

Most of the 3,200 Pacific Northwest veterans taking farm training under the G. I. Bill may qualify for increased subsistence from the Veterans Administration due to recent changes in income ceilings, subsistence rates and dependency status of G. I. students.

Under the new ceilings for G. I. farm trainees, earned income plus subsistence may now total \$210 a month with no dependents, \$270 with one dependent and \$290

with two or more. Previous ceilings were \$175 a month for veterans with no dependents and \$200 with dependents.

Veterans taking institutional on-farm training will receive proportionate increases in subsistence pay for time devoted to school instruction in conjunction with actual farm work. Subsistence will be based on the new VA allowances of \$75 a month for single veterans, \$105 for those with one dependent and \$120 for two or more.

Amount of subsistence rates authorized veterans in job training and those in school. A minimum of 300 hours yearly of school instruction for farm trainees is considered by the VA to equal one-fourth of a full-time school or college course.

Veterans are requested to write or contact VA offices about the pay increases as most of them will be made automatically by the VA.

Hospital Council Discusses Needs Of Vet Patients

The Veterans Hospital Council of the American Red Cross held its bi-monthly meeting at the Veterans Hospital last week, conferring with hospital authorities on needs and services that can be given by the Red Cross to veteran patients.

The council is composed of representatives from Douglas, Lane, Josephine, and Jackson counties, and is headed by Mrs. Halie Huntington of Eugene. Through their efforts, the hospital has obtained many desirable articles not obtainable through regular government channels.

Among recent gifts have been a ceramics kiln for the Occupational Therapy Department, art materials and supplies for the rehabilitation program, decorations and pictures for the wards, furniture, books and periodicals for the library.

At Christmas time, each county contributed 150 wrapped gifts so that each of the 600 patients at the hospital would be remembered. The hospital council also sponsors a monthly Red Cross dance, providing an orchestra, partners, refreshments, and even instruction in dancing for patients.

Last month the Veterans Housing Unit in Eugene was host for the dance, with the Elks Lodge No. 357 of Eugene being the host for the month. A recent project is the reconditioning of a baby grand piano that is to be given to the hospital.

All these enterprises are presented to the council through the Red Cross field directors stationed at the Veterans Hospital. Field Director Visits

M. C. Novak, field director for the American Red Cross, made his regular monthly visit to the Roseburg Veterans Hospital on Thursday of this week. Novak is in charge of veterans' claims, and has his headquarters at the Portland regional office of the Veterans Administration, contacting veterans in all parts of Oregon who have designated the Red Cross as their official agent in presenting claims for service-connected disabilities.

On his visits to Roseburg, he discusses claims and gets information from Clifford Field, Veterans contact representative. Mr. Novak also paid his official visit to Miss Elizabeth Nolting and Miss Lucille Hunter, Red Cross field directors at the Roseburg Veterans Hospital, where about 100 patients have given a power of attorney to the Red Cross to act as their agents.

An interesting conference on

coronary artery diseases was held at the Roseburg Veterans Hospital Wednesday evening. Nearly all the members of the medical profession from Roseburg and nearby communities attended, as well as all staff members of the hospital.

Heart Conditions Eyed

In the afternoon, a pathological discussion was conducted by Dr. Warren C. Hunter, pathologist of the University of Oregon Medical School and consultant in pathology for the Veterans Administration. Patients were examined for heart conditions.

Diagnoses were made from cardiograms, X-rays, and laboratory tests followed by a group consultation. Dr. Homer P. Rush and Dr. Matthew C. Riddle, both of the U. of O. Medical School, collaborated with Dr. Hunter in leading this discussion. Dr. Rush then acted as chairman for a two-hour session of questions and answers with all doctors participating.

The next conference is to be on tuberculosis and the use of streptomycin, with Dr. G. C. Bellinger, superintendent of the Oregon State Tuberculosis Hospital and consultant for the Veterans Administration.

Later this summer, it is anticipated that Dr. Ernest Gellhorn, professor of neurophysiology at the University of Minnesota Medical School, will be at the Veterans Hospital to conduct a conference on that subject, according to Dr. John Haskins, manager of the Veterans Hospital.
