Mrs. C. S. Heinline, Roseburg piano teacher and a member of the National Guild of Piano Teachers, has announced Miss Elizabeth Newman, lecturer, teacher, author and a prominent member of the National Guild, will be in her studio Saturday, May 29, for auditions of the piano students of Mrs. Heinline.

There will be 25,000 pianists playing in auditions sponsored by the Guild this year. Each person is given a private, sympathetic hearing by a Guild representative. Guild standards are those of established music schools with its syllabus based upon requirements of the National Association of Schools of Music, and ranging from elementary to artist grade. Guild auditions are a guide to those who expect to go on the concert stage, write serious or light music, play only for themselves, church, radio, social affairs, or become teachers in public schools and colleges—actually, there is a suitable goal in the Guild for every person studying piano.

\$3,500 in cash prizes and a New York appearance are offered for those who reach advanced professional level. Certificates and rating sheets showing how to improve are given to every one who passes the tests, and a pin signifying membership in the National Fraternity of Student Musicians becomes a prized possession of all successful enrollees. Scholarships leading to degrees are available to outstanding High School graduates.

The audition movement was founded in 1929. It is incorporated as a non-profit membership organization and is open to any piano teacher in good standing.

Miss Newman, adjudicator, will be at Mrs. Heinline's studio all day May 29 and will give certificates of merit for 1948 to students of elementary, preparatory, intermediate and collegiate classes.

Each student will be given a private hearing. Each pupil of Mrs. Heinline is a member of the National Federation of Music Students.

Wouldn't you just love to kill somebody? And especially if you could save a couple of minutes of driving time by doing it? Wouldn't it be thrilling to know that you had ended, or caused to be ended, the life of a human being who otherwise might have become a great benefactor of the race?

Maybe we are "hipped" on the subject of careless and reckless driving. We drive a lot and we see so much of it that we finally become irrational, and maybe intolerant.

Sure, we know it's a fast age we live in. But we all want to keep on living in it, and it doesn't seem fair for some drivers to endanger the lives of others and disregard the rights of others just to get there ahead of them.

Last night we watched a young chap drive several miles. Traffic was heavy, but every half mile or so, he would dash around some car in the face of a steady stream of oncoming rigs. He finally caught up with us, and dashed around, giving us the horn, so we would slow down and give him a chance to get back into his own lane again.

From then in to town he had no chance to pass another car, because five drivers allowed him the courtesy he failed to show them, he passed that many cars, and saved himself the time required to drive about two hundred yards—maybe ten seconds.

This lad looked intelligent. He doubtless thought he was a good driver, and that he was not imposing on others. He was doing what he saw many another driver do. It becomes a habit. But we hope he will consider if the risk of passing five times to heavy 3 o'clock traffic to save ten seconds, against the risk of killing somebody or maiming or crippling himself or an innocent victim for life.
