Newhouser Hits Winning Streak As Detroit's Ace

By JOE REICHLER (Associated Press Sports Writer) Detroit's loyal baseball fans were beaming again today. Hal Newhouser, one of their greatest idols since Ty Cobb, finally has begun to look like the pitcher he was in 1944, 1945 and 1946.

Those were the years the southpaw star rolled up 80 victories while losing only 27 games. Hal's return to form began last Wednesday when he hurled a masterful four-hitter against the Boston Red Sox.

That was only Newhouser's third win of the season. Since he beat the Chicago White Sox in the opening game, he had been shelled from the mound five straight times and had dropped four decisions.

The victory was the Tigers' 16th against as many defeats and strengthened their hold on fourth place. They now enjoy a full game lead over the St. Louis Browns. The defeat dropped the Senators into a sixth place tie with the Boston Red Sox.

Dodgers Quit Cellar. The Brooklyn Dodgers were enjoying a new experience today. They were riding high, wide and handsome in a one-game winning streak. The man responsible for Brooklyn's first success since May 13 was southpaw Preacher Roe. The Brooks had dropped eight straight to fall into the National League basement.

Roe went the route with an eight-hit, 9-4 win over the Cincinnati Reds. Incidentally, it was Roe who won the last Dodger game via a 9-3 score, and then too it was the Reds who were the victims.

The victory pushed the Dodgers up two notches into sixth place, seven percentage points in front of the Chicago Cubs. The Reds dropped into the cellar.

Dubiel, who only 10 days ago whipped the National League leading St. Louis Cardinals, 6-2 in Philadelphia. Blatnik, Philadelphia's rookie outfielder, continued his spectacular hitting with a double and triple, driving in two runs. Dubiel also collected two hits and scored twice.
