Fire Dept. Cites Help At Lumber Plant Blaze

"Valuable help" to the Roseburg Fire Department was rendered by fire fighters of the Roseburg Veterans Hospital and the Douglas Forest Protective Association, during the fire which swept the Roseburg Lumber Co. mill Saturday, Fire Chief Glenn H. Taylor said today.

The hospital and the county fire patrol each furnished a pumper truck to the city, Taylor said. All five of the city's trucks also were used. Taylor expressed appreciation for the aid which was furnished by the outside agencies.

He pointed out that the department's new panel truck was given a "workout" at the fire, transporting gasoline to the trucks at the fire scene and carrying other supplies and equipment.

Dr. Balinkin, one of the world's foremost authorities on color phenomena, told the Inter-Society Color Council of America yesterday:

"If you think you have gray hair, you're kidding yourself. There is no such thing as gray hair. A person with hair 20 per cent white appears gray haired. A person with hair 50 per cent white appears white haired."

First Artesian Well In Douglas County Reported

The first artesian well known in Douglas County was brought in recently at the Richard Hook home near Idleyld Park, according to W. C. Meyers, driller for the W. S. Kernin Co.

The well had been drilled to a depth of 53 feet when a flow of 325 gallons per hour, with "considerable pressure," was tapped, Meyers stated.
