Movie Industry Hails New Device

LOS ANGELES. — (AP) — The movie industry, long fearful of television's effect on boxoffice receipts, is now breathing easier. Projection adequate for a full-size theater screen without the use of film has been demonstrated for the first time to radio and cinema technicians.

This process, kept under wraps for months, enlarges the television image by an optional system similar in principle to that of the 200-inch Mt. Palomar telescope.

Movie executives predict this advancement ultimately will provide theaters with a new lure. Some 2,000 delegates to conventions of the Society of Motion Picture Engineers and the National Association of Broadcasters attended what probably will be chronicled as a historic showing of direct radio, on a screen 20 by 15 feet. The image quality, unlike earlier efforts to adapt television to theaters, was amazingly clear.

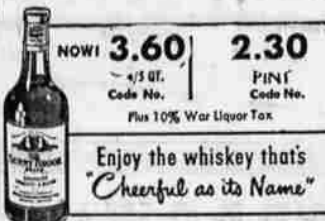
