Funds Recommended For Bonneville Operation

WASHINGTON, May 26.—(AP)—The House Appropriations Committee today recommended \$20,920,700 for the Bonneville Power Administration in the year starting July 1.

The committee proposed also a contract authorization of \$10,268,290 for the northwest agency.

The figures, contained in the

Interior Department appropriation bill, compared with budget requests of \$23,473,000 and \$13,385,000. For the current year, ending June 30, the appropriation as \$10,446,100 and the contract authorization \$7,690,100.

The committee said it cut funds for construction of power lines because representatives of private utilities in the areas affected said they were willing to undertake that construction.
