GUILD ADJUDICATOR TO BE AT HEADLINE STUDIO SATURDAY

Miss Elizabeth Newman, adjudicator for the National Guild of Piano Teachers will arrive in Roseburg to begin hearings of local candidates for certificates and diplomas the morning of Saturday, May 29, at the studio of Mrs. C. S. Heinline in Laurelwood.

More than 100 judges from coast to coast will be at work in 300 centers ascertaining the pianistic progress of America. These national arbiters are selected for their sympathy and understanding of children as well as for their reputation for achievement in some field of music.

They come from University faculties, concert stage, radio networks, musicologists, and devote certain days each spring to judging talent for the Guild. In New York thirty of them work simultaneously for more than a week on the fourth and fifth floors of Juilliard School of Music hearing the hundreds enrolled in the metropolis. Many of them say that there is just as much talent in small towns as in the large cities and that where it is carefully nurtured, it has a better chance to develop away from the hubbub of the vast labyrinth of population.

Big pianists and little pianists, beginners and advanced, teachers and pupils, all gravitate to the audition centers and if they are successful, they come away with certificates, diplomas and pins. The Guild is not competitive, but is sponsored for the purpose of giving pianists chances for advancement.
