Leper to Get Top U. S. Decoration

MANILA, May 27 — (AP) — Joey, the Philippines' best known war hero, will get the United States' highest civilian decoration Saturday in a special ceremony. Joey, in private life is Mrs. Josefina V. Guerrero.

During the war she risked her life daily to get food and medicine to allied prisoners. She also supplied General MacArthur's headquarters with valuable intelligence under the name of Joey.

Her decoration will be the medal of freedom with a silver palm. The U. S. Army Commander in the Philippines, Maj. Gen. George F. Moore, will personally decorate her.

The special ceremony will be attended by Cardinal Spellman of New York. Mrs. Guerrero is a leper. She is confined to the Tala Leprosarium outside of Manila.

Military Men In Civilian Posts Hit By Church Leader

SEATTLE, May 27 — (AP) — The retiring head of the Presbyterian Church in the U.S.A., declared at its national meeting today that "the appointment of military men to civilian posts does not increase the likelihood of clear Christian insights in high places."

Dr. Wilbur La Rue, Jr., Washington, D.C., attorney whose successor as moderator will be elected this afternoon, said in a sermon prepared for the opening session of the church's 160th General Assembly:

"One does not always find in Washington in these critical days the clear Christian insights which one might expect in the capitol of a Christian nation. At times there seems to be more emphasis on provocative military gestures than on seeking peaceful solutions to the world problems; more emphasis on military training than on international cooperation."

"In the whole field of our international relations today there is a moral unsteadiness which would not be there if Christian people had the influence which they should have in determining government policy."

The General Assembly drew nearly 900 ministerial and lay delegates from most of the states and from as far as the north as St. Lawrence Island in Bering Sea.

The layman moderator counseled the need of dedication to ardent Christian ideals and causes, declaring: "This sick world can not be saved unless we ministers and elders are willing to get some scars for the gospel we profess."

He made a single reference to the possibility of union with the Presbyterian church, U.S., which embraces a large southern membership.

"Organic union is a mere engineering problem which we can solve whenever we make up our minds to do it."

Screenings Ban Alarms Oregon's Dealers in Feed

PORTLAND, May 27 — (AP) — Oregon Millers and Livestock Feed dealers expressed alarm today over effects of a Washington state ban on sale in that state of feed containing any type of screenings.

The ban, aimed at import of Canadian feed containing noxious weeds, is effective June 1.

Walter Scott, Sr., president of the Oregon Seed and Feed dealers, said Oregon millers must either quit the Washington market or make up special feeds for their trade across the river. He added that it also may result in Oregon becoming a dumping ground for the Canadian screenings.

Scott said he was in favor of bans on noxious weeds in the feed, but that the wholesale ban on screenings prevents use of good feed material such as cracked wheat screenings. He said virtually all feed contains a portion of screenings.

Three Trainmen Die As Flood Ditches Train

LUNDBRECK, Alta., May 27 — (AP) — Three members of a Canadian Pacific Railway freight train crew were killed near here last night when the engine and seven cars crashed into Rock creek where a bridge had been washed out by floods.

Lundbreck is about 80 miles west of Lethbridge. The three killed were Engineer W. M. Donnett, Fireman Edward Lewis James and Head-end Trainman G. H. Cripps. All lived in Lethbridge.

The creek, ordinarily placid, rose suddenly last night, swollen by melting-snow waters.

The freight crew had no warning of the washout. The engine ploughed into the swollen stream and seven cars piled on top of it.

Other fathers named in various fields included: Radio Father — Eddie Cantor because of his fight for freedom and tolerance.

Sports Fathers — Bob Feller, Cleveland pitcher, on the basis of the "father" he has been to thousands of children.

Screen father — Gregory Peck for his efforts on behalf of child welfare and his portrayal of "Father" in the academy award picture "Gentlemen's Agreement."

Father's day will be observed Sunday, June 20.
