

Arabs Increase Assault On Jews in Jerusalem

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He was cheered by 25,000 Arabs as he toured old Jerusalem with 300 yards of the beleaguered Jews. Arabs demolished more buildings near the big Hurva synagogue, where most Jews in the old city were holed up.

Arab Strategy Told
Abdel Rahman Azzam, Pasia, secretary general of the Arab league said a third of Israel's army of about 45,000 well-trained troops, is in Jerusalem. He indicated Arab strategy was to keep supply lines cut and beat the Jews into submission with shells, thirst and hunger rather

than by house-to-house combat. "We could have taken Jerusalem earlier, but we did not want to sacrifice more men when we are sure of the ultimate result following complete encirclement of the Jews in Jerusalem," he said. He added that peace now would mean only a short delay and then an even bloodier war.

U. S. Ambassador Lewis Douglas talked with British foreign secretary Ernest Bevin in London for the fourth time in five days. The British cabinet met. A focal issue was the fact 37 British officers are serving in Abdullah's Arab legion.

The U. N. itself faced a grave crisis. The seven Arab nations rejected its cease-fire order yesterday in a bold defiance of the other nations of the world. The U. S. delegate said the situation is so serious it requires careful consideration of the American government.

Jews Plight Desperate
Dive bombers attacked Tel Aviv, main city of the Israeli regime. The Egyptians said two Jews arrested near Gaza confessed throwing typhoid and dysentery germs into the Egyptian army's water supply there.

An Arab legion communiqué said 800 Jews had been killed in the battle of Latrun, key highway point southeast of Tel Aviv. They declared the Israelis had suffered a "crushing defeat" in the battle.

The Arabs said also that Jews in the old walled city of Jerusalem, where religious shrines are clustered, had been compressed into 200 square yards. The Israeli forces said they held most of modern Jerusalem. Its 90,000 Jews must by now be desperately short of water, food and perhaps ammunition.

Israeli fighters clung to the Hurva synagogue. Arabs pumped shells into their midst and dynamited nearby buildings. The Arabs rejected a Jewish agency

Samakh, an Arab town of 5,000 at the south of the Sea of Galilee, was found to be a comparatively quiet ruin. The Jews held it, but they were in range of Arab heavy machineguns on nearby hills of Trans-Jordan.

U. S. Criticism Noted

British newspaper took note of increasing American criticism of Britain's policy in Jerusalem. The influential Times of London said "steps must be taken to ensure that British officers are no longer associated with Arab operations in the Holy Land."

Britain has refused to sever ties with the Arabs and go along with a strong U. N. policy as demanded by the U. S., Russia and France.

At Lake Success, delegates seemed stunned by the Arab rejection of the U. N. cease-fire order, albeit they had expected the refusal. The Arabs demanded, among other things, an end to the Jewish state. The Jews promptly refused.

Wallace Charges Hysteria On Part of Bill's Backers

COEUR D'ALENE, Idaho, May 27—(AP)—Henry Wallace has interrupted his presidential campaign and is flying to Washington, D. C., today to testify against the Mundt-Nixon bill at a Senate hearing Saturday.

He said that "the attempt to force the Mundt bill through the Senate in an atmosphere of artificially created hysteria indicates the desperation of the anti-peace forces."

Wallace and his running mate, Sen. Glen Taylor (D-Idaho) were on the same platform yesterday for the first time in their campaign.

Taylor, whom Wallace referred to as "the most courageous senator in the last century," told an audience of 1,800 that European aid should be administered through the United Nations. He termed the Marshall Plan "a fake and a phony."

Taylor said the United States is building an "armament economy" and declared "once you get an armament economy saddled on you, it is almost impossible to get rid of it because so many jobs depend on guns and tanks."

He said he "had to go with

Henry Wallace because both the old parties lost all their zip and go."

After his talk, Taylor called his wife and two sons to the platform to join him in singing.

"When I was campaigning for the Senate I used to sing for you, and I'm no better now," he declared.

Wallace said at a press conference that he has no intention of withdrawing from the campaign.

It doesn't matter whether Eisenhower or anybody else runs on the Democratic ticket. We're going right through the election and beyond."

Wallace issued two statements during the day, one on the General Motors-United Auto Workers settlement, the other on railroad labor.

Of the General Motors settlement, Wallace said it will probably establish a pattern which will be followed in other plants and industries.

"Although (the settlement) is less than we should have liked to see, we can hope that this pattern can be forced on big steel, the key industry which has been adamant in its refusal to meet the worker's demands," the statement said.

In the railroad labor statement, he said "railroad management is making it clear that public ownership will be necessary to protect the railroad workers, travelers, independent business and farmers. No industry which relies on government power to protect profits and oppose workers can be labeled free enterprise."

UNION, Ore., May 27—(AP)—Water ran 18 inches deep down the main street of Union today but was receding—a daily performance for the past four days.

High daytime temperatures, melting snow in the mountains sent Catherine Creek raging out of its banks and last night it reached a new high.

Although the level in downtown was dropping today, water was cascading along side streets, flooding basements but causing no major damage. Another rise was expected this evening as effect of the day's melting snow was felt.

In the country, an estimated 10,000 acres of Southern Grande Ronde Valley farmland was flooded. Old residents said not in 50 years had they seen the water as high.

Trees uprooted by the surging creek threatened two bridges. Highway crews with bulldozers

stood by to pull debris from the bridge footings.

FORT LEWIS, May 27—(AP)—The 36th Engineer combat group yesterday added water to the things it is sending to flood-stricken areas of Washington and Idaho.
