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Uniform Schedule Of Grazing Fees Fixed by Bureau

WASHINGTON, May 27.—(AP)—The Bureau of Land Management has adopted for the first time a uniform rent schedule for grassland outside the federal grazing districts.

The bureau also abolished its 35 filing fee for applications to lease these tracts too small or too scattered to come within the regular grazing districts.

The new rates for these "section 15 lands," so-called because they are administered under section 15 of the Taylor grazing act, vary from one tenth of a cent an acre a year for the least productive areas to 44 cents for the best forage.

Last year some 10,000 stockmen leased more than 11,500,000 acres of this scattered type of public land.

Altogether section 15 lands total 37,000,000 acres, compared with 142,000,000 acres in the grazing districts.

The new rates are effective for all new leases or renewals issued on or after May 1. Any 55 filing fees paid after May 1 will be applied on rental payments.

The new "section 15" rates are on a sliding scale based on the grazing capacity of the land. In Colorado, California, Idaho, Montana, Oregon, Washington and Wyoming, the capacity is measured on the basis of surface acres per animal unit month. An animal unit consists of one cow or horse, or five sheep or goats.

Scates Explained—Thus, if two sections of land—1280 acres—are needed to feed one cow per year, the grazing capacity in the bureau's schedule is 107 acres per animal unit month, and the yearly lease rate per acre is one tenth of a cent.

At the other end of the scale, where the grazing capacity is a quarter of an acre per animal unit month, the yearly lease rate per acre is 44 cents; half an acre, 22 cents; one acre, 11 cents; two acres, 5 1/2 cents; and so on.

In Arizona and New Mexico, however, the grazing capacity is estimated by the livestock industry on a year-long basis. Thus, if it takes two sections to feed one animal unit one year the grazing capacity is listed as 5 and the yearly lease rate per acre is one tenth of a cent.

At the other end of the scale, where a section can support 213 animal units for a year, the lease rate per acre is 44 cents.

The bureau said it does not, however, limit the number of animals a lessee may graze on section 15 lands, but leaves that up to the discretion of the stockman.

In the federal grazing districts, by contrast, a per capita rate is used: Eight cents a year per head, for cattle and horses; one and three fifth cents per head for sheep and goats.

The council's main effort at this time will be to construct a cook house at the camp site, and later to build 10 or 12 cabins.

grenades.

Without emotion, the grim visaged Ma described the mass milking. It was carried out last week at Ningshien, a Kansu province village near here.

The check was made in Lincoln, Washington, Yamhill, Marion and Tillamook counties. Other checks are due elsewhere in the state.
