## Supply Line at Stake In Holy Land Battle

Jerusalem into three thick stone buildings. Hurva Synagogue, intact outside but ruined within, fell to the Arab legion. The last 400 or fewer Jews in the old city were in an area smaller than a city block. The rest of the Jewish quarter is a smashed ruin, powdered by demolitions and shells.

The old city is but a small part of Jerusalem. The Jews claimed their strong armed forces and the 90,000 Jewish residents held most of the modern city. The Arabs, encircling all Jerusalem, attacked the southern part.

Futile peace talk went on in the United Nations. Neither the big powers nor the combatants could agree.

Britain proposed a four weeks armistice with an arms and immigration embargo. If peace were not made in that time, the British want strong measures. The

Jews denounced the idea as a product of the British-Arab alliances.

Russia reintroduced a U. S. proposal demanding peace within 36 hours, or U. N. sanctions and an international force. The Jews liked that one; the Arabs didn't.

President Truman indicated U. S. action on lifting her arms embargo to the Middle East would depend on the U. N.

The British told the U. N. she is making plans to insure that British officers will not serve the Trans-Jordan legion in Palestine; that she will review in the light of U. N. decisions the next \$8,000,000 subsidy due Trans-Jordan July 12; and that if an arms embargo is declared, she will stop treaty deliveries to Egypt, Trans-Jordan and Iraq.

The American-British talks continued in London in an effort to stop the fighting. A Jewish spokesman said unless peace comes, Holy places in Jerusalem doubtless will be destroyed.

The Egyptians said they captured two American and two other fliers fighting for the Zionists. The Cairo government charged formally that two Jews acknowledged infecting wells near Gaza with typhoid and dysentery germs. Jews retorted that this talk was "anti-Semitism."

The United States and the United Kingdom purchased over three-fifths of Canada's exports for the first half of 1947.

wishes to pursue.

6. Contestant must be in good health and of the white race.

7. Contestant may be either amateur or professional.

8. The winner of the official state or key city preliminary contest will receive free transportation to Atlantic City, New Jersey, and return, first-class accommodations and meals at a leading Atlantic City hotel, and a wardrobe consisting of three or four evening gowns. Transportation and wardrobe will be supplied by organization sponsoring official preliminary contest, and the Miss America Pageant will provide hotel accommodations and meals while competing in national finals in Atlantic City.

9. If for any reason contestant

winning official preliminary contest is disqualified or released from appearing in the Miss America finals at Atlantic City, then the next choice of the judges shall be considered the winner.

10. No employee of a sponsoring organization, nor resident of Atlantic City, N. J., is eligible to enter the competition.

**Scholarships Posted**

The contestants must sign an official entry blank, which requires that they abide by all rules laid down by the Miss America Pageant committee.

A committee of great national firms have contributed the 1948 Miss America Scholarship Fund amounting to \$25,000, to be divided as follows: Miss America, \$5,000; first runner-up, \$3,000; second, \$2,500; third, \$2,000; fourth, \$1,500; next ten finalists, each \$1,000, and most talented contestant, at in finals, \$1,000. All amounts are scholarship grants.

Scholarship contributors are Joseph Bancroft & Sons Co., Wilmington, Delaware; Catalina Knitting Mills, Los Angeles, Calif.; and F. L. Jacobs Co., Detroit, Mich.

## Woman Beater Starts 10-Year Term in Prison

SALEM, May 28.—(AP)—Richard Eoff was taken to the state penitentiary yesterday to begin serving a 10-year sentence for beating a woman.

Eoff's wife was in the state hospital, still critically ill from self-inflicted bullet wounds. She tried to shoot her husband last Sunday in his county jail cell, Sheriff Denver Young asserting she and her husband had a murder-suicide pact.

Eoff withdrew his appeal to the state supreme court yesterday, so began serving his sentence immediately. After he finishes the sentence, he probably will be taken to Missouri to finish serving a life sentence for murder. He was paroled from this sentence a few years ago, and being convicted here for assault makes him a parole violator in Missouri.
