

Two Cops Will Headline Next Boxing Card

Dallas Bennett, Roseburg, Will Battle Eckstein Of Grants Pass Here June 16

Dallas Bennett, Roseburg officer, is scheduled to meet George Eckstein, member of the police force at Grants Pass, in the main event of a police benefit boxing card scheduled for June 16 at the armory, according to an announcement today.

Eckstein, who weighs in at around 200 pounds, compared with Bennett's 180, was here early in May to scout Bennett in his professional fight with Leo Talbot of Portland. The fight is slated for 10 rounds.

The Grants Pass cop has had plenty of ring experience, and at one time held the title of heavyweight champion of the East coast. He is reported to be working out daily to get in shape for the card here.

To guarantee a well-rounded boxing card, two six-round fights and two four round bouts are also on the card.

K. O. "Logger" Schroot, 190-pound, six-foot one-inch Roseburg man, who is considered a pushover in Oregon fight circles, will be in the semi-final match possibly against Gordon McKay, 200-pounder from Klamath Falls.

Nazirod, Holmes Re-Matched Another bout which should hold plenty of interest for local fans will see Bobby "Kid" Nazirod in a rematch with Chris Holmes, Salem. Nazirod took a knockout decision over the Salem tough boy in their appearance here Tuesday night of this week, but Holmes has asked for a rematch.

Holmes won the crowd's acclaim when he refused to give up after taking plenty of punishment from the Roseburg youth.

The two preliminaries will be announced later. Tickets will go on sale the first of the week, and members of the local police force are predicting that there won't be any left to sell at the door. Grants Pass police have asked for half of the 1400 tickets, both reserved seats and general admission, and expect to invade the town with a huge force of supporters to back their fighter.

The A's split the next two with the Tigers, swept a pair at St. Louis, two more in Chicago and then smeared Washington last night 7-3.
