## Summer Recreation Needs Discussed by Committee. Required Materials Listed

Ray Brown, delegated by the Citizens Recreation Committee to make a survey of the recreation beach at the south end of Mosher street, reports that dressing rooms, plumbing and part of the float at the site have disappeared and will have to be restored.

Brown, physical education instructor at Roseburg Junior High School, reported also that to comply with the Recreation Committee's desires that a soft ball diamond and an area for basketball, volleyball and horseshoes be cleared, a bulldozer will be needed to clean and level the area.

Two floats used in former summer swimming programs are in fair shape, but rope and oil drums for additional float facilities are needed, he said. Also needed are some one and one-fourth and one and one-half inch pipe for chinning bars, parallel bars and for making weights made with cement and pipes. The latter has been popular with boys in previous recreational programs on which he has worked, he told the Committee.

### Plans Outlined

A meeting of the Committee was held Wednesday afternoon in the office of Superintendent of Schools Paul Elliott to outline plans for a summer recreation program for Roseburg.
