Counties Delinquent In Welfare Contributions

PORTLAND, May 28.—(AP)—The State Public Welfare Commission attempted to find out today what to do about counties which have not paid their contributions to the welfare fund.

The commission rejected yesterday a proposal that it sue the counties in a test to settle the question of state quotas.

Several counties have protested the quota amounts set for them by the state.

They cannot, however, get federal matching funds unless they have paid their quotas. Nearly empty county coffers have interfered with quota payments.

The commission said it would confer with the state attorney general in an attempt to find another way to settle the affair.

The commission said increased seasonal employment, plus a shortage of funds, cut welfare spending last month. General assistance totaled \$452,188 for 17,513 Oregonians.

George Duke Decisions

Bobby Volk in 10 Rounds

HOLLYWOOD, May 28.—(AP)—George Duke, San Francisco middleweight, won a unanimous decision over Bobby Volk of Portland, Ore., last night in the 10-round feature bout at the Hollywood Legion Stadium.

Duke, who turned in a classy job with repeated short lefts and right uppercuts, opened a gash over his opponent's left eye in the second round. By the eighth, Volk's cut was bleeding freely but he nevertheless managed to finish the bruising scrap.

Duke, the favorite, weighed 161 and Volk scaled 161.

Cleveland Blanks Chisox, Cardinals Boost League Lead

Connie Mack, whose luck seems to be all good for a change this year, apparently has found the relief man he wants in the veteran Nelson Potter.

His Philadelphia Athletics figure to have just above the best pitching staff in the American League. But Connie wanted an experienced man to play fireman when one was needed.

A couple of weeks ago the Athletics bought Potter from the St. Louis Browns in a straight cash deal. This season he has done much and had a sore shoulder.

Strictly a starting pitcher with the Browns ever since 1943, Potter has been used three times in relief for the Athletics, always in relief. He worked once in a losing cause, then saved a game for Joe Coleman.

Last night in Shibe Park against the New York Yankees he clinched the job. He entered the game in the fifth with two on and one out. He escaped with out a run and from then on the Yankees couldn't move past first.

In all, Potter gave up only two hits and received credit for the 6-3 victory. It was the sixth in a row for the A's who maintained their one game first place margin over the Cleveland Indians.

Cleveland stayed right behind by whipping the Chicago White Sox, 2 to 0, in Chicago.

The Boston Red Sox slipped to seventh place again by losing to the Senators, 2-1, in Washington.

A seventh inning rally brought the St. Louis Browns a 5-4 victory over Detroit and moved them to within three percentage points of the fourth place Tigers.

Cardinals Stretch Lead In the National League the St. Louis Cardinals increased their first place lead to three full games over the New York Giants, although rain shortened their game in Pittsburgh to a 1-1 six-inning tie.

The Giants couldn't handle the Philadelphia Phils in the polo grounds and lost, 5 to 3.

The Brooklyn Dodgers finally caught up with the Boston Braves and beat them, 7 to 5, in Boston. It was the first time the Dodgers had turned the trick in the last nine games between the two clubs.

Hank Sauer hit his 11th and 12th home runs and Grady Hatton.

It's a long climb from the bottom to the top of the Pacific Coast League standings but Seattle's Rainiers may make it.

The rejuvenated Rainiers, in the cellar on April 24, improved their second-place position last night by nipping Portland, 5-4, in 11 innings for their sixth straight win. It was Seattle's 13th triumph in the last 15 times out and lifted the Rainiers within 5 1/2 games of the present favorites, the San Francisco Seals.

A single by relief pitcher Bob Hall, his first hit of the year, broke a 4-4 deadlock in the second overtime inning. He drove in Leon Mohr who had reached base when he was hit by reliever Jake Mooty.

Mohr had tied the score in the bottom of the ninth when he came home on pinch-hitter Lou

Novikoff's single to right.

Angels Trim Seals

The Los Angeles Angels helped both themselves and Seattle by tripping San Francisco 6 to 2. The win evened the series at two-all, with five games remaining.

Hurler Charles (Red) Adams registered his fifth victory of the season and for Cliff Melton it was his fifth reverse.

For the second straight night, Hollywood and Oakland needed three hours to complete their game and last night's proved a weird fracas. Casey Stengel's Oaks won 9 to 7 to take a 3-1 series lead.

Billy (The Kid) Martin, Oakland's sensational 19-year-old infielder, spanked a triple with the bases loaded in the eighth inning which clinched the contest.

The Oaks used 19 players and the Stars 14. Four Oakland hurlers—Will Hafey, Bob Klinger, Floyd Speer and Damon Hayes—issued 12 walks, three of them forcing in runs. Pitchers Ed Oliver, Bill Butland and Ed Albosta dished up eight passes to the Oaks.

Jack Graham batted in six runs to almost single-handedly engineer San Diego's 7-3 triumph over Sacramento. Graham clouted his 20th and 21st homers of the season, both with two aboard, to boost his runs batted in total to 36.

Both homers were over the 326-foot right field fence.

Three School Districts Schedule Merger Vote

Taxpayers in the Green, Dillard and Brockway school districts will vote Tuesday, June 1, on the question of consolidation. It was announced today by Mrs. Lula C. Gorrell, county school superintendent. Times of voting in the various districts will vary, she said.

The proposed consolidation would involve a total of 131 children in the Green district, 235 in the Dillard district, and 22 at Brockway. The figures are based on school census population. Total of valuation of the district would be \$2,457,580 if the proposal is approved by the voters.

Annual poppies should be sown where they are to grow, and their seed may be broadcast whenever the soil can be loosened an inch

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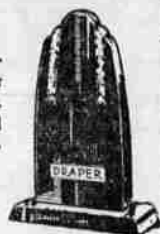
