**Yugoslav Red Congress Faces Russian Snub**

Cominform (Communist International Information Bureau) in that organization's dispute with Yugoslav Communists. Last week the tiny country severed trade relations with Yugoslavia and ordered the expulsion of Yugoslav military, political and cultural missions from Albanian soil. Yugoslavia countered with a series of notes to Tirana charging Albanian authorities with insulting Tito's regime. The Cominform early last week accused Tito and his aides of deviating from Marxism and of pursuing a hateful policy toward Russia. Yugoslav Communists noisily defended themselves and kept up a running fire of reports of support for Tito from Communist elements within Yugoslavia and from the nation's diplomats abroad.

WASHINGTON, July 7.—(AP)—The wave of nationalist feeling sweeping Eastern Europe has spurred a flood of rumors about possible drastic moves by the Russians to tighten their hold over the satellite countries. These rumors include unconfirmed reports of Soviet troop movements in Romania and Bulgaria toward the Yugoslav border. They also disclose a revival in Europe of the old speculation that Russia may try (a) to annex Romania and Bulgaria as Soviet Republics and (b) to put the Red army back into Czechoslovakia, from which it withdrew at the end of the war.

About the most that can be said for the rumors at the moment is that they are receiving careful study at the State Department and National Defense establishment.

Washington officials seem to be, however, that while the Russians find themselves in a tough spot in their own satellite sphere they will try to solve their difficulties without resorting to the open use of military power.

that when the Vanport interview was first arranged, he understood he was to meet with several committee representatives. Since then, he added, he learned of a mass caravan demonstration with threats and demands. "I'm not going to get up with that sort of thing," Hall said. The Vanport committee was organized a few days after the Columbia River flood waters burst a dike and shattered the war built apartment city. Several committee delegations have appeared before the Portland City Council with demands for cash grants to Vanport families, requisition of hotels for housing and resignation of members of the Portland Housing Authority which operated Vanport. Mayor Earl Riley had abruptly adjourned the last of the hearings after audience demonstrations.

**Ford Boosts Price on Two More Truck Lines**

DETROIT, July 7.—(AP)—Price increases on two more of its truck lines were announced yesterday by the Ford Motor Co. The increases range from 5.4 per cent for the series F8 133-inch wheelbase, 8-cylinder, three-ton chassis with cowl to 9.3 per cent for the series F7 195-inch wheelbase, 8-cylinder, 2 1/2-ton chassis with cab. Last week Ford announced increases in the list price of Ford's light trucks.

**Portland Slayer Draws 15-Year Prison Term**

PORTLAND, July 7.—(AP)—Arnold E. Inman, 35, Northwest Amateur golfer, has been sentenced to a maximum of 15 years in prison for slaying his gasoline service station business partner. Judge Martin W. Hawkins sentenced Inman yesterday to the death of Everett L. Keith, 39. He was convicted of manslaughter. Inman pleaded self-defense.

for reckless driving were made for the month of June. So far this month, Baird said eight reckless driving charges had been filed and that six of those arrested were some of the reckless youths referred to in the letter. Chief Baird said the Police Department now has at least three men on duty every night. This includes a sergeant, a desk man, and an officer in the powl car. In addition, a motorcycle policeman and a foot patrolman patrol the streets from 1 p. m. to 2 p. m. every day. The chief attributes the increase in reckless driving arrests to these factors. He said that with the increase in patrolmen, the Police Department will be able to deal more effectively

with speedsters in the future. The Council voted to answer the letter to Gordon, bringing out these facts.

**Funds For Swim Pool**  
Checks amounting to \$16,890.02 were received from the City Park Commission, earmarked for the City Swimming Pool fund. The money was accompanied by a list of donors who had contributed with the intention that it go into the swimming pool fund.

The Council discussed a rough draft of the new city building code and turned it over to the City Attorney for further study. The code was drawn up by city plumbers, electricians and builders and proposes to install inspectors to see that a uniform building code is carried out in rough form and if approved later by the Council, will be perfected and become a city ordinance.

**For New Sewer And Truck**  
A low bid of \$8,792.96, made by Rouse and Bell Co., for a new sewer system in Kinney's improved Addition was accepted. The Council found that the bid was a little less than \$100 over the City Engineer's estimate for the work. Kinney's Addition is in North East Roseburg.

Bids were read on new ton-and-a-half pickup trucks, and a low bid from Lockwood Motors for a new Ford truck was accepted. The new truck will replace the Model A pickup which was recently sold to George Fretz later he and the truck both "retired."

The Council also approved the City Attorney's suggestion that a letter be sent to property owners with land abutting the Rose Hotel alley, warning them to pay their assessments. According to sections 78, 79, 30 of the City Charter, property can be sold if the assessments are not paid.

The Council also placed under committee advisement the request by California-Oregon Power Company that Railroad Alley be vacated.

Weisgerber was granted permission to open a permanent business in Roseburg to be known as the Roseburg Hudson Motor Company. The Council waived the \$1,500 bond which the city requires of temporary businesses. Bills outstanding against the city were approved by the Council.

In a lighter vein, Mayor Albert Fliegel requested that the County Court and the Sheriff's office be alerted during the coming week-end because of the forthcoming motorcycle races scheduled Sunday at the Fair grounds. "Just to be on the safe side," said Mayor Fliegel, "I'd like to have these county offices on the watch this weekend. We don't want a repetition of the recent Riverside debacle."

Mayor Fliegel was referring to the trouble Riverside, Calif., had over the Fourth of July holidays when motorcyclists literally took over the town.

An ordinance extending the city fire zone in the northern part of the city was passed after its third and final reading. The new area includes that portion of the city lying along the alley east of Winchester street, north to Park street, west to

Winchester, north to the north city limits, and includes all the area in the city limits west of this line and north of Rose and East First Avenue South.

that an effort will be made to stampede the convention. He declined to say whether backers of Eisenhower are involved but no other campaign has reached boom proportions.

"We are taking measures to cope with the situation," he said. "I have no fear we will be able to handle this in an orderly manner."

WASHINGTON, July 7.—(AP)—The White House said today that President Truman has made no arrangements to attend the Democratic National Convention opening Monday in Philadelphia. The president has not yet said he is going.

Press Secretary Charles G. Ross told reporters who asked him about Mr. Truman's plans. In recent years, it has become customary for presidential nominees to visit the convention and make an acceptance speech. Mr. Truman has been reported confident the Democratic Convention will nominate him on the first ballot.

Ross turned aside questions

concerning Mr. Truman's preference for a vice-presidential running mate if he receives the nomination. Mr. Truman's statement last week that the matter is up to the convention is "still true," Ross said.

In response to other questions, Ross said:

The White House has no comment on the "I could not accept" statement issued by Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower in comment on efforts of anti-Truman Democrats to "draft" the former Allied military chief for the presidential nomination.

During the day, John Nangle, Democratic National Committeeman from Missouri, visited the White House. On leaving, he told reporters that Mr. Truman "without question, will be nominated on the first ballot."
