Educators Seek Dewey's Attitude On Aid to Schools

CLEVELAND, July 8.—(AP)—New York delegates attacked and defended Gov. Thomas E. Dewey's record on education yesterday before 2,700 delegates at the National Education Association's annual representative assembly.

The debate ended indecisively when a motion was adopted to delay the discussions until tomorrow, and to attempt to have Dewey state before then his stand on federal aid for education.

Yesterday the New York governor sent word through his secretary, James C. Haggerty, that he would discuss federal aid at length during his campaign as Republican nominee for President.

Many delegates, however, expressed a desire to have Dewey go on record about federal aid at the current meeting of delegates representing 440,000 NEA members in every state and territory.

NEA President Glen E. Snow of St. George, Utah, promised an effort would be made to get a statement from Dewey himself. The report was made by Lyle W. Ashby, chairman of the National Education Association's

committee for overseas teacher relief. Ashby told 3,500 delegates to the NEA's annual convention that the idea started with Miami, Fla., teachers last summer and got underway in state and local associations in October. Since then, he said, more than \$250,000 given by American teachers has been spent for food, clothing, books and scholarships for their fellow teachers in 30 countries.

GOLD MINING SLOWS

SYDNEY, Australia.—(AP)—Gold production in Australia is still declining, although experts say a great fortune is waiting to be mined. The output for April was 61,036 fine ounces valued at \$2,099,520. In March it was 65,007 ounces and in April last year 68,856. Although still greater than during the war years, the production of gold is lower than prewar figures. In 1939, 1,415,897 fine ounces were produced, but last year the total output was down to 1,088,003 ounces.

An estimated 169 millions of patterns were sold in 1947.

USED CAR GETS AROUND
