Retiring President Forrest Loeve announced today he has been appointed deputy district governor by Lee Murphy, Junction City, the new district governor. Loeve will be installed along with the new Roseburg Lions officers. Dr. L. M. Lehrbach is the incoming president.

City Incorporation Requested by Elkton

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On the west side of the city limits would extend along the westerly boundary of the S. A. Civil Rights Plank Urged by Negro Groups

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on behalf of 21 Negro organizations, declaring:

"The day of reckoning has come when the Democratic party must decide whether it is going to permit bigots to dictate its philosophy and policy or whether the party can rise to the heights of Americanism which alone can justify its continued existence."

White's statement concluded: "We, therefore, urge and insist that the platform of the 1948 Democratic convention endorse without equivocation the entire program of the president's Committee on Civil Rights and especially those provisions to suppress lynching and mob violence; to ban the poll tax as a voting requirement; to afford equality

of job opportunity and to abolish discrimination and segregation in the armed services, education and transportation."

Helen Hall, speaking for the national federation of settlements, told the platform committee:

"We urge that the recommendations of the president's civil rights commission be made a prime charge on unfinished business not only in the congress but in the party conventions which every four years become potential legislative bodies in setting government ahead."

"So long as the FEPC (Free Employment Practices Commission) or its equivalent is shelved, as poll taxes are shelved, the exercise of the right to vote, as lynching continues as a survival of barbarism, we come into the councils of the world lowered by our failure to make good on the great demands we stand for as a free people."

The labor organization came forward with a hard-pounding demand for a "Roosevelt platform." Carey urged that the Democrats pledge:

1. Federal laws against lynching, poll taxes, discrimination in employment, and racial separation in the armed services.
2. Repeal of the Taft-Hartley labor law.
3. Public housing; price controls; health insurance; greater social security; higher minimum wages; federal aid to education; an excessive profits tax, and other measures.

There was evidence, however, that some Democrats were, and some weren't.

James Roosevelt, traveling toward Philadelphia with the 52-vote California delegation, said Salt Lake he thinks Eisenhower still would accept the nomination if the convention opening Monday demonstrates that the party is united behind the general.

"I can't help but think that when General Eisenhower, understanding the national and international crises, knows that the party and the nation are for him, he will allow the convention to place him in the White House."

Mr. Truman's aides said some suggestions had been made that Roosevelt be named as the vice-presidential candidate in a compromise move. They added they had rejected this proposal.

Out of the Deep South, with its rebellion against Mr. Truman's civil rights program, came word from Senator Lister Hill of Alabama that he is not giving up on Eisenhower. Alabama, first on the roll call list, could make it possible for Eisenhower's name to be the first offered to the convention.

Hill, who voted for the military draft, said that Eisenhower can't escape a draft any more than the nation's youth.

"If we are to draft our youth," Hill said, "we can draft their commander-in-chief."

Will Offer Ike's Name

Former Gov. Chauncey Sparks said, on the other hand, that while he doesn't think Alabama or the South is for Truman, he thinks the president's nomination is a cinch.

But Queens Democratic Leader James A. Roe announced he will offer the convention a resolution asking that Mr. Truman step aside. He said he also plans to place Eisenhower's name in nomination.

Without reference to this, Paul E. Fitzpatrick, New York Democratic chairman, said that his state's Democrats are "proud to stand" on Mr. Truman's record.

Out of all this Truman-Eisenhower talk came a new voice to urge a compromise on Justice William O. Douglas of the U. S. Supreme Court.

Walter P. Reuther, president of the CIO-United Automobile Workers, said his union looks on Douglas as "a man whose universal appeal can unite the Democratic party and the independent vote."

"The Douglas boom showed no signs of catching on a convention city where the Benevolent and Protective Order of the Elks were displaying more life than most citizens thought the Democrats can whip up next week."

Brother of Slain Gunman Wins Race For Sheriff Job

SALLISAW, Okla., July 8—(AP)—E. W. Floyd, brother of Charles (Pretty Boy) Floyd, one-time "public enemy No. 1," apparently will become Sequoyah County sheriff next January.

On the basis of almost complete returns in Oklahoma's primary election Tuesday, E. W. Floyd apparently has won the Democratic nomination with a 300-vote margin. He will have no opposition in the November general election.

The notorious "Pretty Boy" was killed in East Liverpool, Ohio, Oct. 22, 1934. He was shot by federal agents after they surrounded him on a farm seven miles from the city.

"Pretty Boy" lived up to his vow: "I'll never be taken alive." And now his 40-year-old brother says he will live up to his vow—that of making a good sheriff.

His supporters think so, anyway.

Berlin Stranglehold Tightened by Russians

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British and French sectors of the city. The western allies were working out emergency employment schemes to keep idle industrial workers off the streets. An unemployment assistance plan giving workers between 50 and 60 per cent of their normal wages was introduced.

Col. Frank L. Howley, the American commandant, announced that the western powers had decided to maintain the present food rations but to cut coal. He said:

"To meet the emergency, to save 2,000,000 Berliners from starvation as well as economic and social destruction, the United States, British and French military governments are engaged in the greatest air lift in peace-time history. Thousands of tons of food, fuel and medicine are being flown from the west to Berlin."

"It is, however, recognized that with the limited air fields avail-

able and the narrow air corridor allotted, the air lift cannot at present meet all of the requirements of the people of Berlin."

American fliers heard complaints from two of their comrades of strange radio interference in the air corridor to Berlin.

There were unconfirmed reports that Soviet Marshal Sokolovsky had gone to Moscow for consultations, presumably regarding an answer to the western allies' protest over the Russian blockade.

Pinch Works Both Ways

Howley, in a statement to the Berliners, asked the people to "bear in mind that freedom and democracy always have been purchased only by struggle and suffering."

He referred to the claim of the Soviet administration that "the economic strangulation of Berlin is caused by railroad technical difficulties," and added:

"If this is the case, it is hoped that prompt action by the Soviet military administration will restore normal traffic to Berlin."

There were new indications that the Russian blockade was pinching both ways. The U. S. military government made public a complaint from Soviet Marshal Sokolovsky against the halting of deliveries from the British-American occupation zones to the Russian zone. The deliveries were stopped after the Russians began their squeeze in Berlin.

Foreign Undersecretary C. P. Mayhew told the British Parliament that it costs \$60 a ton to fly coal to Berlin in two-engined DC-3 transports.
