BANGKOK — (P) — When you call a policeman in Bangkok, he sure you get a \$2 a month man, not a two-bit one. One group joins the force voluntarily. These make 30 ticals a month. That's slightly less than two U. S. dollars. The rest of the force, about 6,600, are conscripts assigned by the army. They are paid four ticals a month—about 25 cents. The police director-general, Major General Luang Chatrakarn Kosi, says this disparity in pay makes the conscripts unsatisfactory policemen. He asked the finance ministry for more money. The budget boys turned him down.
