**Even Yugoslavia
Well-to-do Join
Tito's Supporters**

BELGRADE, Yugoslavia, July 8.—(AP)—Yugoslaves are witnessing a strange phenomenon today. The Belgrade "reactionary" is swinging behind Marshal Tito. Yugoslavia's fierce national pride has been stung by the taunts of Moscow and the Cominform. As a result, Titoism, which may prove to be the Yugoslav's own peculiar brand of Communism, is spreading. This new word is catching on outside the country, too.

The Belgrade "reactionary" always has represented the formerly well-to-do people who wanted no part of Communism. Now he is saying, "I'm for Tito." Two weeks ago this would have been an unheard of thing among the stubborn opponents of the Tito regime. Now, with the Communist information bureau accusing Tito of straying away from Leninism, it is not so strange.

The effects of recent events upon the peasants and ordinary working people also are quite apparent. Many of the every-day people of this country have been bitter enemies of Communism and its threat of collectivization of the land.

But they prefer Tito's brand of Communism to Moscow's because Tito is a Yugoslav. They view the charges by the Cominform as foreign intervention. It is generally believed they will follow a man who is strong enough to lead them against this.

**Proposed Crematorium
Stirs Singapore Debate**

SINGAPORE.—(AP)—The proposal that Singapore build a crematorium is running into opposition from the colony's Moslem minority. "Islam prohibits cremation of the dead," a Moslem Missionary Society official declared. "It is a most contemptible act in the eyes of Islam."

The society plans to make strong protests against the suggestion of the Singapore municipal commissioner, that the colony save land by burning corpses instead of burying them.

**Former Astoria Mayor
J. C. Ten Brook Dies**

ASTORIA, Ore., July 8.—(AP)—John Conrad Ten Brook, 74, former Astoria mayor and superintendent of dredging died of a heart ailment Tuesday. He supervised the construction of the north and south jetties at Fort Stevens in 1893, and in 1926 was elected to the first of three mayoralty terms.

Last year he relinquished the post of port of Astoria dredging superintendent to his son, John.

**Boothill Graveyard
At Tombstone
Inspires Truman**

TOMBSTONE, Ariz.—(AP)—Epitaphs in Boothill Graveyard here tell some of the story of early Tombstone—the town "too tough to die."

President Truman gave national prominence to the western lore of the cemetery when he paralleled his White House efforts to the life of a cowboy whose headstone reads, "Here lies Jack Williams. He done his damndest."

Many of the original epitaphs of the men who died with their "boots on" were collected by souvenir hunters before a watch was kept over the graveyard.

Boothill's first group of graves mark the climax of the famous Clanton-Earp feud which ended with blazing gun play 67 years ago. The single marker reads: "Tom McLowery, Frank McLowery, Bill Clanton—Murdered on the streets of Tombstone." That's the quoted opinion of Clanton sympathizers.

Then there's George Johnson who had a sad demise. He was—"Hanged by Mistake," or so his marker reads. Other hangings weren't accidental with an 1884 head board attesting to the legal execution of Dan Dowd, Red Sample, Bill DeLaney, Tex Howard and Dan Kelly. Trial of the five, accused of killing four townspeople during a holdup, was conducted legally, but mob justice had its say.

"Died of Wounds" ends one man's story, with "Ambushed by Apaches" and simply "Killed by Indians" vividly telling another Western history chapter. Dumped unceremoniously in his final resting place, a cowboy's epitaph tells of his death: "John Blair. Died of smallpox. Cowboy throvred

rope over feet and dragged him to his grave."
