Sen. Pepper Forestalled
The end of the stop-Truman movement came suddenly and with an element of real drama yesterday. Again it was General Eisenhower who provided the drama with his telegram to Sen. Claude Pepper.

The senator was preparing a statement, he said at that very moment. He did not disclose its contents but people close to him intimated that he intended to call upon the president to step aside in favor of someone else.

General Eisenhower's telegram arrived. It had gone to the senator's Washington office and had been forwarded to Philadelphia. With its arrival, there was no statement.

Made in the operating budgets of various city departments. The Police Department budget has been almost doubled—from \$6,000 last year to \$11,300 in the coming year. Four men are now employed on the Sutherland Police Force and the city is purchasing a new police car.

In the words of the American note, which Secretary of State Marshall signed, the United States government "declares it will not be induced by threats, pressures or other action to abandon these rights." Marshall then sought to clinch the point by adding:

"It is hoped that the Soviet government entertains no doubts whatsoever on this point."
