Methodists Elect Three New Bishops

SEATTLE, July 10.—(AP)—The western jurisdictional conference of the Methodist Church is scheduled to assign newly elected bishops and set the boundaries on its newly created fourth jurisdictional "area" today. It will act on the recommendations of the committee on Episcopacy.

Three bishops were elected in lengthy balloting yesterday and last night.

They are Dr. Gerald Hamilton Kennedy, minister of St. Paul's Church, Lincoln, Neb.; the Rev. Donald H. Tippet, pastor of First Church, Los Angeles; and Dr. Glenn Randall Phillips, pastor of First Church, Hollywood.

Officials emphasized they are bishops of the entire church, not just the western conference. Today's action will set the location of episcopal residences as well as assign the bishops.

Three vacancies have been created here by the establishment of the new area, the resignation of Bishop Wilbur E. Hammaker of the Denver area and the death of Bishop Bruce R. Baxter of the Portland area.

'Why Do Children Ever Go Home?' Question Raised

PULLMAN, Wash., (AP)—The question, said the professor, "is not why are children on the streets, but why do they ever go home?"

Dr. Wallis Beasley, assistant professor of sociology at Washington State College, told a housing conference here that many homes in the United States are too overcrowded to appeal to children.

He said 18 per cent of the homes of the white population in the country are crowded and 7 per cent seriously overcrowded. The non-white homes, he said, are two to three times as bad, 39 per cent being crowded and 23 per cent being seriously overcrowded.

Work Situation Improved; Bean Harvest Nearing

It is reasonable to assume that a majority of lumber operations in Douglas County have returned to normalcy after "the long wet season," said George T. Foster, manager of the Oregon State Employment Service, in his monthly labor market letter today.

The recent showers had an adverse affect on some operations but it is believed the work cessation will be of short duration. Construction work is moving into "full swing" with several buildings in various stages of completion.

During the past few weeks, he added, there has been considerable activity in the hay fields, which was a result of the warm sunshine prevalent during part of June.

Until recently there was no particular shortage of workers with the exception of skilled craftsmen and clerical people, Foster said. At the end of June it was noted that there were openings in all fields and in all skills in those fields. The 168 openings on hand represented a 50 per cent increase over the previous month.

The number of claimants for unemployment compensation fell off 42 per cent during June. This is accounted for by the increased opportunities. Of the 177 active claims on file, 66 were those of women and 54 were of veterans. Included in the total is the weekly itinerant service to Myrtle Creek.

The employment outlook for the future is "good." The problem will be to secure adequate qualified workers. Employers having housing of some sort available will have an advantage over those without housing.

On or about Aug. 1, there will be a demand for bean pickers. The crop is estimated to be one-half again larger than last year and 800 pickers will be required to harvest the beans. Registrations for this type of work are now being taken at the local office.

Contempt of Congress Citations Favored

NEW YORK, July 10.—(AP)—A House Education and Labor Committee said yesterday it would recommend that nine labor leaders be cited for contempt of Congress because they refused to tell the committee whether they are communists.

Rep. Charles J. Kersten (R-Wisc.), announced the Committee's plan at the end of three days of hearings into alleged Communist infiltration into the CIO department store worker's union.

Kersten said the hearings were adjourned until recalled by him and he would recommend the contempt action to the full Education and Labor Committee. The group conducting the hearings here is a subcommittee.

The California city was selected yesterday. Jacksonville, Fla., was chosen for the 1949 meeting of the federation's board.

Dr. K. Frances Scott, associate professor of hygiene at Smith College, Northampton, Mass., yesterday was elected president of the federation. She succeeds Miss Sally Butler of Indianapolis, Ind.

Other officers elected were: District Judge Sarah T. Hughes, Dallas, first vice-president; Miss Ethel Murray Johnston, San Francisco, second vice-president; Miss Helen G. Irwin, Des Moines, Ia., third vice-president; Miss Luella K. Baum, Leavenworth, Kan., recording secretary, and Miss Maude Doyle, Albuquerque, N. M., treasurer.
