

Wife of Jobless Man Wins Jackpot Worth \$30,000

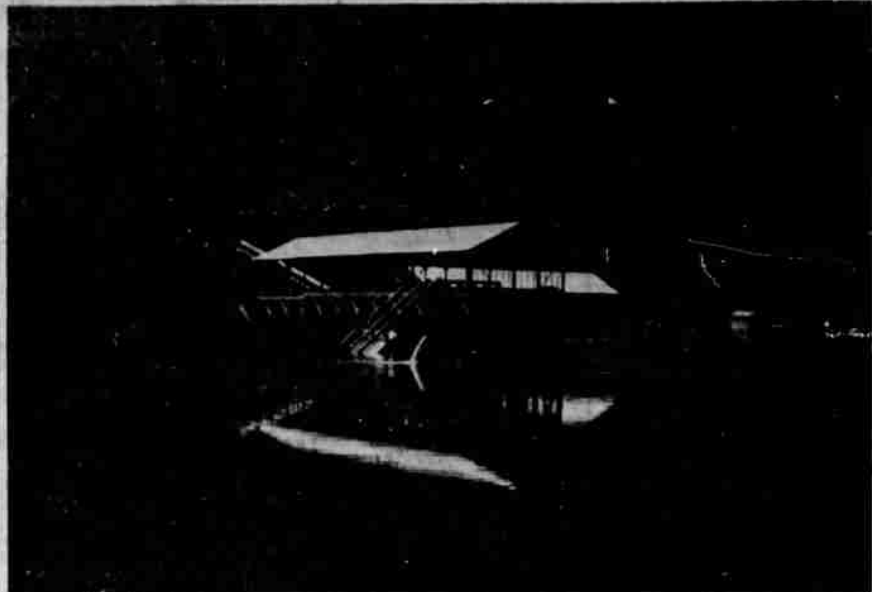
SHENANDOAH, Ia., July 12.—(AP)—“I know that I won't win because no one ever wins who needs the prize,” Mrs. Bessie Lawrence said Saturday 20 minutes before she was announced as the winner of a \$30,000 radio jackpot.

The 54-year-old wife of an unemployed nursery worker and carpenter, wrote the letter judged the best in a contest sponsored by the “Abbott and Costello Kid Show,” and carried by the American Broadcasting Company.

Mrs. Lawrence, married for 35 years and the mother of five children and grandmother of eight, said she had always “dreamed” of owning her own home. She lives in a two room “walk-up” apartment.

The Lawrences, who had been worrying about where the next meal was coming from and where they would get next month's rent, now are wondering about the tax on \$30,000.

The Shenandoah housewife's jackpot includes a \$5,000 mink coat, a \$4,795 four-place airplane, a new four-door sedan, a \$3,000 house trailer, a \$1,250 diamond ring and furniture.

Splintered Personality Evident As Democrats go Into Convention

PHILADELPHIA, July 12.—(AP)—The Democrats went to Convention Hall today, suffering from a bad case of split personality.

A man with this affliction knows not whether he is coming or going, much less in which direction. And that was precisely the situation in Philadelphia as the party of Thomas Jefferson gathered to nominate a candidate for the presidency.

It was split, first of all, on a north-south axis.

But there were fissures within fissures, cracks within cracks, and splinters, slivers and broken pieces pointing in every which way. The “Solid South” was hardly more than a pile of jackstraws. The north was little better.

Doubtless as a result of this, an atmosphere of happy confusion prevailed in the convention city as the party settled down to business.

The Eisenhower headquarters on Broad Street have been transformed, with a few strokes of a painter's brush, into the base for Senator Claude Pepper of Florida.

The sign is the same. It still asserts, in large blue letters—“the people's choice for president,” but underneath, in a space that formerly was blank, it now speaks for Senator Pepper.

Uninviting Spot

The Senator invaded these rooms last evening. He found them here, an empty citadel behind a brave and colorful front. The plaster was peeling from the walls, and the floors were littered with debris. It had been a facade, and nothing more.

But it had taken “Ike” more than six months and three separate statements to convince his admirers that this was so.

Pepper set up a table and some chairs. A heavy crush of reporters, photographers and newsreel men arrived. The familiar

white lights gleamed, and sweat poured down in streams.

The Senator said he was a candidate, introduced his handsome wife, and submitted to questions, which he answered easily.

Wrangles And Growls

Meanwhile, the delegates from his own state, Florida, were gathered for a caucus in a hotel across town.

They wrangled through the first 15 minutes of the meeting about a shortage of tickets for the visitors' gallery. It developed that a chunk of tickets had disappeared, leaving only 32 available.

Somebody said that was an insult to Florida, and he growled, “what are they going to do—fill up the place with hoodlums from California?”

At this same moment, the lobby of the Ben Franklin hotel was filling with delegates. Two weeks ago, this was the white-hot center of activity for Senator Robert A. Taft, before he and the others were steam-rollered by Gov. Thomas E. Dewey.

But now there was no talk of politics. There was however, one busy corner. Quite a crowd had collected, as though some informal caucus was taking place.

It had gathered around 11 pin-ball machines.

Shoes Hurt You? Sufferers Given Summer Advice

Watch the faces of pedestrians to determine who's having foot troubles.

And, for those people who “wear” their foot troubles on their faces, here's a tip or two from Miss Lucy Lane, O. S. C. extension specialist in clothing and textiles, who offers this suggestion on foot and shoe difficulties:

A careful scrutiny of a pair of worn shoes is often the giveaway. If the front part of the sole shows excessive wear and the back portion shows little wear, for example, the shoe is likely too short for its wearer, Miss Lane declares. In cases where the uppers bulge out over the soles, suspect the shoe as being too narrow.

The clothing specialist emphasizes that during hot summer days, correct fit to shoes is highly important. During warm weather it is more comfortable to wear shoes that allow plenty of toe room, yet fit snugly over the arch and around the heel.

Shoe soles are important, too, for foot comfort, Miss Lane states. Most comfortable soles are those of medium weight. Heavy soles are hot and take on excessive “weight” during hot weather. On the other hand, thin soles cause burning feet.

For those people who have continual foot trouble, Miss Lane suggests that they check up on their posture, blood circulation and general physical fitness.

Here is a tip for the tired shopper who returns home to find her feet hot and swollen after a busy day trudging through stores and on downtown sidewalks: Relief is often obtained by rubbing the feet with alcohol or an epsom salts-water solution. Sometimes alternating hot and cold on the feet will bring relief. Foot powder also provides some comfort, Miss Lane concludes.

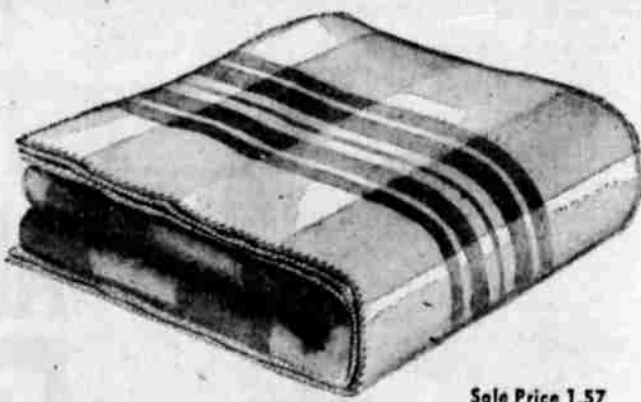

NEW YORK, July 12.—(AP)—The American Council of Christian Churches has protested an order banning The Nation Magazine from libraries of the New York City school system.

The magazine was banned by the Board of Superintendents because of a series of allegedly anti-Catholic articles, and the action was approved by the City Board of Education.

In a letter to both boards, the council said: "We believe that every Protestant to whose attention this matter has come will regard this as yet another expression of unmistakable subservience to the pressure of Roman Catholicism."
