Democratic National Convention Launched

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California, where there was much anti-Truman sentiment last week, was lining up behind the President.

It voted 42 to 12 to support him on the first ballot.

While Lane and Barkley were getting most talk as vice presidential possibilities, 'edding said he considers the race "wide open."

Perhaps Barkley is the leading possibility, he said.

Senator Claude Pepper and Laney were entered as presidential candidates last night.

Southern delegates who had been planning a fight against Douglas, if he chose to run, generally reacted favorably to reports that Barkley now might be the choice.

Senator Fulbright (D-Ark.) told a reporter he thinks most of the Dixie delegations rebelling against Truman's civil rights program would go along on Barkley.

There was less enthusiasm among the Southerners, however, about reports from some administration sources that the presidential favor might be turned toward Governor Lane of Maryland.

Delegates generally agreed that President Truman can win whoever he wants for his running mate.

The question was whether Southerners would fight over the second place as they have over the presidential nomination by advancing Governor Laney of Arkansas to oppose Truman.

Senator Pepper of Florida made a belated and almost single-handed entry into the race against Mr. Truman yesterday.

Pepper took over the physical properties—but few of the supporters—for the boom for Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower.

The convention itself offered a day of speech-making as the main attraction in a hall where the Republicans last month picked Gov. Thomas E. Dewey of New York and Gov. Earl Warren of California for their ticket.

Senator Francis J. Myers of Pennsylvania, welcoming the delegates, called in a manuscript for a "two-front war" in which

he said the Democrats can win in November with President Truman.

He said the party would be "back at the Roosevelt-New Deal" stand under Mr. Truman, fighting "the reactionary, dominant isolationist right" on one hand the "totalitarian Communist left" on the other.

National Chairman McGrath lashed out at what he called the record of "negativism, obstructionism and retrogression" rolled up by the Republican-controlled 80th Congress for nearly two years.

Finally, in their rush to adjourn ahead of last month's GOP convention, the Rhode Island senator added in his advance text, the lawmakers jammed through "legislation that will prove to be ill-timed, illogical, and utterly meaningless in the solution of the critical issues of our times."

Other Possibilities

Besides Lane and Senator Millard Tydings of Maryland, other candidates for vice-president mentioned include Senator Joseph O'Mahoney of Wyoming, who has strong Western support; Senator Scott Lucas of Illinois; Senator Brien McMahon of Connecticut; Senator Francis Myers of Pennsylvania; Gov. Mon Wallgren of Washington and Rep. John McCormack of Massachusetts.

A Pennsylvania delegate, John S. Rice, even suggested that the party might turn to Secretary of State Marshall to help strengthen its ticket.

Pepper, who has been an off and on critic of President Truman and boomed Eisenhower until the general killed the draft effort last week, failed to get the immediate support of the Florida delegation for his own presidential venture.

He asked for the state's 20 votes. But the delegation took no action. Pepper estimated he would get 60 if a poll were taken.

The return of the critical to the Truman camp continued.

New Jersey delegates, who previously had voted to support Eisenhower, cheered a proposal by Frank Hague, state Democratic leader, to cast their 36 votes for Mr. Truman.

Berlin Warns on Soviet

Mayor-elect Ernest Reuter, of Berlin, told 10,000 cheering members of his Social Democratic party in the U. S. section of blockaded Berlin:

"We must establish a frontier to Russian power. If Berlin falls, the liberty of all east of the Elbe falls with it."

The Kremlin said nothing of the three allied notes demanding an end of the blockade. The consensus in Berlin was that the Russians are trying to force the western allies into a four-power discussion of the overall German question.

German news agencies spread the report that Marshal Sokolovsky, the Russian military governor who stopped trains, trucks and barges from the west, will be transferred to a field command when the crisis is over.

Coal Shortage Serious

Planes steadily increased the flow of food to Berlin. Coal is another matter, however, with winter approaching. Economic paralysis spread. Production dropped 40 to 80 per cent in the coal-starved plants of western Berlin.

Yugoslavia declared that "sympathetic groups" who crossed its frontiers have been captured.

Koreans in the southern part of the country occupied by the U. S., and those in the north which Russia holds were establishing separate governments.

Both hope to take over eventual rule of the whole country.

France prepared to grant \$100,000,000 increase to government employees on strike or about to walk out. Premier Schuman said the United States will be giving France \$1,100,000,000 a year under the Marshall Plan, at the expense of U. S. taxpayers.

"The Marshall Plan is the greatest enterprise in history for the solidarity of humanity," he said.

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said the administration might be willing to go along on such a plank if it did not "nullify" the civil rights proposal.

Senator Francis J. Myers of Pennsylvania, platform committee chairman, described the secret document as following "generally in outline and philosophy of the New Deal—a Roosevelt-Truman platform."

It remained to be seen whether the words the sleepy-eyed drafting committee of seven came up with at 3:30 a.m. would please either side in the red hot civil rights battle.

Floor Battle Impends

At almost the same time the Dixie group was huddling yesterday, five self-described "liberals" on the platform subcommittee went into a "rump" session and

decided to carry to the convention floor their battle for a strong civil rights program.

Later the 26-vote Minnesota delegation decided unanimously to back a floor fight for a "liberal" platform.

Mayor Hubert H. Humphrey of Minneapolis, one of the leaders in the rump platform committee session, said California, Nebraska and Iowa delegations are solidly behind the proposed battle.

First word of the rump meeting came from Rep. Emanuel Celler of New York. He said the others who attended included Mayor Humphrey, Mrs. Esther Murray of California, William Ritchie of Nebraska and former Senator Hugh B. Mitchell of Washington.

Ritchie said later, however, he did "not go all the way" with the others in demanding that the platform call for Mr. Truman's detailed civil rights program.

"I see no use in slapping the South in the face," the anti-Truman Nebraskan said.

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
