

Rudderless Plane Lands O. K. After Trip Over Cascades

SEATTLE, July 12.—(P)—"If I'm going to crash, I want to be close to home."

That was the explanation given last night by Grover C. Greimes of Seattle why he and a companion flew a rudderless small plane across the Cascade Mountains after striking high-tension wires near Yakima.

The plane lost its rudder and damaged its propeller when it struck the wires on a flight from Kennewick to Seattle. Greimes said he was "blinded by the sun" at the time.

A few moments later when Greimes flew over the Yakima field to drop a note telling his destination, Civil Aeronautics Administration officials said the plane's course was so "erratic" that all crash equipment at the field was mobilized.

Similar precautions were taken at Seattle's Boeing airport where it was presumed the plane would land after its hazardous flight over the Cascades.

But Greimes brought his crippled craft to a safe and uneventful landing at Lake Air Park, a small private airstrip east of Lake Washington's Mercer Island.

Greimes said he steered the plane by "opening and closing the doors" during its cross-mountain trip.

Mechanical Cowboy Used To Give Bulls Exercise

MANHATTAN, Kas. — (AP)—The cowboy has gone mechanical at Kansas State College.

To give bulls exercise needed to keep them in top condition, an electrically driven "bull exerciser"—something of a merry-go-round—has been set up in the college's dairy barn.

An electric motor drives a rotor from which extends four lengths of pipe. The bull's chains are attached to the ends of the pipes, and they are led around as the pipes revolve.

Farmers of Douglas County Doing Full Share in Carrying Out Conservation Program

The 483 farmers of Douglas County who are participating in the Agricultural Conservation Program are cooperating with farmers in all of the agricultural counties of the United States, says J. F. Bonebrake, chairman of the county ACA committee.

Farmers through their ACA committees are carrying out farming practices to conserve soil and water in every county in the United States, except the 23 counties which are non-agricultural. In Douglas County the main conservation practices being carried out by farmers are seeding approved pastures, clearing for pas-

tures, application of limestone, phosphate, and construction of drainage ditches.

Farmer-elected committees administer the program in all the communities and counties where the program is in operation. Bonebrake cites three reasons for the program.

First—The need for soil and water conservation is urgent. Food producing land is limited, population is increasing and soil must be saved now. Assistance under the AC program has proved the most effective way of getting the needed conservation.

Second—Responsibility for conserving our soil and water resources is national. Everyone depends on the products of the soil and everyone should have a share in the responsibility of protecting the present and future food supplies.

Through the ACP consumers and producers share the cost of the conservation practices. This year that cost is about \$1. per person. The farmer matches that—and then contributes the necessary work.

Third—It's the most economical way of getting the needed conservation work done. Erosion, if let go, becomes more expensive to correct with each passing year. Not only is there a bigger job to do but the soil lost cannot be restored.

Cost-of-Living Increase In Pay U. S. Steel's Plan

PITTSBURGH, July 12.—(P)—A spokesman for the U. S. Steel Corp. says that company will increase wages for its 170,000 workers "in view of a continuing climb in the cost of living."

The spokesman, who asked that his name not be disclosed, said the increase will be announced this week. "The corporation is under no obligation to increase wages," he said, but feels "the workers should be protected" because of the cost of living.

Philip Murray's United Steelworkers Union, a CIO affiliate which represents U. S. steel workers, earlier had sought a pay boost, but the corporation rejected the bid on the ground it was seeking to halt an inflationary spiral.

Second Man Jailed In Child Brutality Case

PORTLAND, July 12.—(P)—Police reported today a second

man faces prosecution in the brutal treatment of a 2½-year-old boy now in a hospital and a twin sister who is in a children's home.

Sgt. John Warren said Pablo E. Garcia, 21, walked into police station yesterday and told of a "humping" game with the father of the two children. Sgt. Warren said Garcia claimed he had joined with John Archuleta, 26, in seeing who could thump the skull of Archuleta's twins the hardest with their snapped fingers.

Archuleta and his common law wife, Thelma Lorraine Riley, were arrested Friday after police found the children seriously beaten.

Garcia was quoted as saying the two men stopped striking the youngsters when the girl started to scream. Garcia was held under \$1500 bail.

Jet-Propelled American Planes Off for Germany

BANGOR, Me., July 12.—(P)—Pointed for troubled Germany in the Air Force's first jet-propelled trans-Atlantic flight, a group of P-80 Shooting Stars roared into Dow Air Base today from Self-

ridge Field, Mich.

Sixteen specially groomed planes were scheduled to make the trip but one failed to start up. Destination of the pioneer flight which will test long-range jet operations, is Europe's diplomatic hot-spot, the American zone of Germany.

The operation unfolds a new era of lightning-fast communication that will half the time between America and Europe.

Taking every precaution, the strategic air command called on six multi-engine planes to accompany the jets.

Tot Drowns as Father Goes for Wife and Baby
