

Diamond Lake's Mosquitoes to Get Spraying of DDT

Mosquitoes at Diamond Lake will be sprayed with DDT July 15 by the Bureau of Entomology and Plant Quarantine. This project is an experiment under the direction of A. W. Lindquist of Corvallis, to see what can be done to control the mosquito. It is planned to spray 400 or 500 acres near the lake to control the adult mosquitoes. This may not cover all of the area needed, but the experiment will be limited by the spraying materials available.

The Bureau of Entomology and Plant Quarantine has informed Supervisor M. M. Nelson of the Umpqua National Forest that the spraying will not affect the fish life in Diamond Lake. This has been agreed upon by Dr. Paul Needham of the State Fish and Game Department.

The spraying at this time of the year is an effort to kill the adult mosquitoes. A more successful method would be spraying early in the season to kill the mosquitoes before they were hatched, but there was some doubt about the effect such spraying would have on small fish that have just hatched. The laboratory experiments will be conducted this season to determine if it would be safe to spray early in the season before the mosquitoes have hatched.

Activities to Be Discussed at Meet Of Red Cross Unit

Don Legg of San Francisco, field representative for the American Red Cross, will be in Roseburg July 13, 14, and 15 to confer with officers of the Douglas County Red Cross Chapter. It was reported today by Russell Stephens, executive secretary.

Legg will discuss the activities which are to be promoted by the chapter. Stephens said these would include organization of a motor corps, first aid instruction classes, and extension of the hospital workers corps.

Mrs. H. L. Bailey is serving as chairman of the motor corps. The corps will use the chapter's new station wagon. Volunteers will be asked to serve as drivers for Red Cross workers who need transportation to their places of duty.

Miss Edith Nolting, Red Cross field director at the Roseburg Veterans Hospital, is acting as supervisor of the Gray Ladies and other hospital workers. Volunteers are needed for the Gray Ladies, Stephens said. They may contact the Red Cross chapter offices or Mrs. Forrest McKay, chairman of the Gray Ladies.

John Zenor is first aid chairman who soon will schedule a series of first aid classes. These will lead eventually to the establishment of first aid stations throughout the county, each to be in charge of at least two qualified Red Cross first aid men.

Plane Lights Tested By Make-Believe Flights

ROCHESTER, N. Y. — (AP)—College students are flying blind on long, make-believe cross country flights in studies to make night flying safer. They "fly" in a Link trainer, guided by instruments lighted with different colors and different intensities of light. The purpose is to learn how much or how little light is needed to light airplane cockpits efficiently, and what colors may reduce fatigue. While a pilot needs enough light to read his instruments quickly, the light should not be strong enough to interfere with his ability to see objects outside the cockpit.

The project is headed by Dr. S. D. Spragg, assistant professor of psychology at the University of Rochester, and was undertaken for the Air Material Command at Wright Field.

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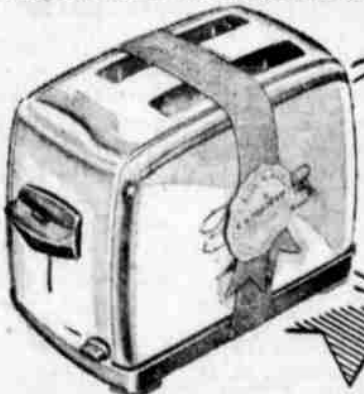


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
