

## Killer Probed For Possible Link With 'Black Dahlia' Case

SEATTLE, July 14. — (AP) — Possibility that John Russell Gasser, confessed slayer of a red-haired, attractive restaurant carhop, might be linked with the unsolved "Black Dahlia" slaying in Los Angeles last year was being investigated today by Seattle police.

Similarity between the California slaying and that of 22-year-old Donna Woodcock here last Saturday prompted Los Angeles authorities to request the investigation.

Detective Austin Seth of the Seattle police homicide detail said he questioned Gasser closely for 40 minutes yesterday about his activities since his discharge from the navy here in July, 1946.

He said the youth stuck to his original statement that he had not been away from the vicinity of Seattle except for a trip to Pullman since that date.

Chief Criminal Deputy Prosecutor J. Edmund Quigley said the 20-year-old youth told him that while still in the navy he had been in "some trouble" with a girl in California and received cuts on his hands at the time.

Seth said he planned to check Gasser's story with his relatives and friends.
