EVERYBODY LIKES FRESH BERRY JAM

Save Sugar and Berries, Get More Glasses This Way

6 Cups Ground Berries (Any Variety)
8 1/2 Cups Sugar
1 Package M.C.P. Jam
and Jelly Packet

Wash, stem and grind 3 quarts fully ripe berries, or crush completely one layer at a time so that each berry is reduced to pulp. Measure exactly 6 level cups crushed berries (add water to fill out last cup, if necessary) into a large kettle. (For Strawberry Jam and Black Raspberry Jam add 1/2-cup lemon juice to each 6 cups crushed berries). Add the M.C.P. Packet, stir well, and bring to a boil, stirring constantly. NOW, add the sugar (which has been previously measured), mix well and bring to a full rolling boil. BOIL EXACTLY 4 MINUTES. Remove from fire, let boil subside, stir and skim by turns for 5 minutes. Pour into sterilized jars, allowing 1/2-inch space for sealing with fresh paraffin.

NOTE: If you cannot get paraffin, use the following "hot seal" method: Pour hot jam into pint or quart Mason jars to the brim; screw lids on tightly (use 3-piece lids) and invert jars on lids until jam begins to set. This sterilizes lids. Then shake jars well and set upright. This keeps fruit evenly distributed.

Ballot Box in Marion Contest Jimmed Open

SALEM, July 15, (AP)—Marion county clerk Harlan Judd said yesterday that the lock on a Jimmed last weekend.

The box contained ballots from Salem Precinct No. 1, which is the center of a court contest in the Republican state representative race between John F. Steelhammer and H. R. Jones, both of Salem.

Judd said he doubted whether the ballots actually were disturbed. Police took fingerprints from the box. Judd said the ballot boxes were kept in a locked room on the top floor of the courthouse.

Steelhammer was declared winner by only one vote in the legislative contest, but Jones contends an error was made in Precinct No. 1 and that the outcome actually was a tie. Circuit Judge E. M. Page ruled in favor of Steelhammer, and Jones' supporters have appealed to the State Supreme Court.
