

Nation's Press Sharply Divided On Democratic Party's Choice Of Truman as Presidential Candidate

Some American newspapers viewed the Democratic nomination of President Truman as a wise choice. Others assailed it editorially, and several maintained Mr. Truman's election chances are slim.

"The delegates chose well," said the Nashville Tennessean. "There is in him (Truman) a strength which was not at first perceived. Respect for Truman has grown immeasurably because of the consistency with which he has stood by his principles."

The paper added that Mr. Truman and Sen. Alben W. Barkley, the vice presidential nominee, will "support and interpret a platform which holds hope of still better things for the country."

"The Cleveland Plain Dealer said: "It is symbolic of the disunity that has developed within the Democratic party in recent years that the convention selected as its candidate a member who was in no sense genuinely pleasing to any one of the major blocs in the party, and in the process became involved in a ruckus which conceivably could mean the end of the Democratic party."

Declaring the Democrats "obviously had no other choice but Harry Truman for president, the Indianapolis Star said:

"The 12-year tenure of President Roosevelt made the rise of other Democratic leaders almost impossible. . . . The vice-president nominee, Sen. Alben Barkley, likewise has a long and consistent record as a 100 per cent New Dealer. . . . The Democratic ticket that now goes before the people is truly representative of the kind of government the American people have had for the past 16 years. The people will get a chance to decide on its record."

"One Act of Wisdom" The Charlotte (N.C.) Observer said the convention's "one act of wisdom was the nominating of Sen. Barkley, because he will come nearer than any other man who could have been nominated to bridge the wide gaps that separate the contending factions."

The Baltimore Sun said the "frantic effort of big city bosses to ditch Mr. Truman" form an "episode in the party's history which no one can be proud of."

But in the debate on the civil rights program, the paper added, "The convention acquitted itself in remarkable fashion" without "cheap demagoguery," but with an "earnest effort on the part of two groups representing opposing points of view to set forth points of view in clear and adequate statement."

Although "Harry S. Truman has little chance of being elected," commented the Salt Lake Tribune, "as long as he is president of a nation to which other nations look for inspiration, the smear squads of all patriotic parties and factions should be ashamed or suppressed."

"One Praiseworthy Position" The New York Times said Southerners who "turned against Mr. Truman because of his civil rights program" are "quarrelling with one of the most praiseworthy positions taken by the president during his three years in the White House."

While "at the moment, Mr. Truman faces long odds," the Times added, "the time is still early, and the independent voter, we believe, will wait upon the progress of the campaign and the development of the position of both parties on the great issues of the day before he makes his final choice."

"In the months ahead, the American people will give President Truman their sympathy, even though they may not give him their votes. . . . President Truman has been launched as a candidate for re-election with almost unprecedented handicaps. That circumstance should lend color to the campaign that will ensue. His recent tour of the west suggests that his future course will not be without its blunders. It will be interesting to see how successful he will be in regaining the prestige of which his own political party has largely robbed him."
