Kansas Storms Deal Big Damage; One Man Killed

HUTCHINSON, Kas., July 16. (AP)—One man was killed and at least 34 persons were reported injured in a series of severe thunderstorms which swept across Kansas Wednesday night. Hail and winds of up to 100 miles an hour accompanied the downpours. Bruce M. Waterfield of South Hutchinson was killed as he lay ill in bed. His house was virtually blown apart by the wind. Extensive damage also was reported at Wichita, Ellis, and Nickerson. At Hutchinson, 4.11 inches of rain fell in an hour and a half. Unofficial estimates of damages ran well above \$1,000,000.

Enlistment of 18-Agers Under Draft Act Dated

WASHINGTON, July 16 (AP)—The Army, Navy and Air Force will begin accepting special enlistments of 18-year old volunteers under the new Draft Act on next Wednesday, July 21. Secretary of Defense Forrestal announced the date after getting Budget Bureau approval for use of the necessary funds. Each force will accept enlistments in approximately equal monthly numbers within the limits set by the Service Act. These limits annually are: Army 110,000; Navy 36,000, of which 6,000 is allotted the Marines; Air Force 15,000. Total 161,000.
