Californian Wins Major Title At Salem Trapshoot

SALEM, Ore., July 17. (AP)—The Grand Pacific International Trapshoot Class A title was headed toward California today in possession of O. E. Fine of La Grange. He earned it.

The California scattergunner ended the regular 200-bird shoot yesterday in a three-way tie for first, and had to fire through seven extra 25-bird sets before shaking off Walla Walla's Stan Brock.

Fine, Brock and Dr. R. D. Hoard of Los Angeles each cracked 198x200 over the regulation distance. Hoard was eliminated when he missed one target in the first 25-bird shoot-off.

Brock finally missed the seventh bird of the last 25 targets, while Fine mowed through without a miscue.

During the regulation run and shoot-off, Fine cracked 233 straight targets, Brock 228.

E. J. Dearing, Portland, won the Class B title with 197x200; Harry Elden, Central Point, Ore., cracked 24x25 to win a four-way shoot-off for Class C honors after ending regular competition with 194x200; and D. Nebergal, Albany, Ore., won Class D with 190x200.

Jim Hopkins Tops Bowling Scorers

The Men's Doubles Bowling League saw some close action Thursday night as five competitors bowled over the 200 mark at the Roseburg Alleys. But none of the contestants came close to approaching Jim Hopkins' record for the night.

Hopkins topped top honors for both the high individual game and series scores with a 239 single and 649 series. His efforts weren't enough, however, as the opposing team won two of the three games, by virtue of a higher handicap.

Moving Process May Delay Checks To Jobless Vets

Readjustment allowances paid to unemployed veterans during the coming week may be delayed slightly because of moving check processing operations from Portland to Salem, the State Unemployment Compensation Commission announced today.

The check register of July 15 was the last put out from the Portland office, while the Salem operation is expected to be ready by July 21. Claimants normally receiving checks July 20 to 22 on claims filed the previous week may have to wait from one to three days, officials said.

Of the 32 employees of the Portland office, 11 are expected to move to Salem. The move was forced by the state agencies' budget curtailment recently announced by the Federal Security Agency as the result of heavy cuts in Congressional appropriations. The processing offices will be consolidated with S. U. C. central office operations in Salem.
