

C. P. Snoddy Dies In San Francisco

Word was received here today of the death of Charles Price Snoddy, 64, formerly of Roseburg, in the Southern Pacific hospital at San Francisco Saturday.

He was born at Bloomfield, Iowa, Jan. 23, 1884. He started work for the S. P. at Portland in 1913. He was transferred to Roseburg March 8, 1917, and remained here until two years ago, when he went to Eugene.

Snoddy served as a Roseburg city councilman and was active in social and civic affairs.

Surviving are the widow, Myrtle Flury Snoddy, Eugene; a daughter, Martha Ruth Snoddy, Eugene; a son, Robert Charles Snoddy, Shanghai, China; his

mother, Mrs. Martha E. Snoddy, Seattle, Wash., and a sister, Mrs. Edith I. Barnett of Seattle.

The Veatch-Hollingsworth-England Chapel at Eugene will make the funeral arrangements.

Boy Cyclist Killed By Train, Playmate Survives

ST. HELENS, Ore., July 19. — (AP)—A young bicyclist was flung 50 feet, but survived collision with a train that killed a playmate near here yesterday.

Ronald Bogardus, 8, Warren, Ore., who ran in front of the Spokane, Portland and Seattle train, was killed outright. Phillip Hickey Jr., also of Warren, was close on the heels of Bogardus. His bicycle crashed into the locomotive. Hickey, who suffered only scratches, said neither was aware of the train.

vidual topics. As for the price bill, Ross asserted:

"The ten-point program is still good, although it is being examined in the light of developments which have occurred since it was first submitted."

Among the ten points covered in the anti-inflation message Mr. Truman sent to congress last November were proposed authority to impose rationing and price and wage ceilings if necessary.

Ross would not comment on whether the president's proposed bill would re-impose wartime price controls directly.

Meanwhile angry Southern Democrats, as well as Republicans, marked President Truman as a target for hot criticism in the coming special session.

Senator McClellan (D-Ark.) made it clear that Dixie party members who didn't walk out of the Philadelphia convention aren't going along docilely with the president's summer law-making program for civil rights measures, inflation control steps and housing and education aids.

The Arkansas Senator, who

fought Mr. Truman's nomination but stayed in the party, told a reporter that unless some international developments require congressional action, the recall of the lawmakers for next Monday may prove "tragic."

"If the president's program, as he outlined it to the Democratic convention, is carried out," McClellan said, "we will have either uncontrolled inflation because of the government spending he proposes, or a police state."

Dewey Ready to Aid

What direction the Republican attack on Mr. Truman will take remained unclear. Although some GOP lawmakers have taken the president to task for what they call a political move, there was no sign that Gov. Thomas E. Dewey, the Republican nominee, has reached any strategy agreement with congressional leaders.

A close friend said Dewey stands ready to cooperate with House Speaker Martin, Senator Taft and others in drafting a GOP plan of action.

As for the GOP platform and the special session, Dewey was said to believe that it would mean keeping Congress at work until November to try to write many of those pledges into law.

On this score, Rep. Clarence J. Brown (R-Ohio) said he sees the returning lawmakers under no "particular obligation" to either the Republican or Democratic platforms.

Brown said the platforms are a proper matter of debate during the campaign.

"The people have the right to say by their vote what they want and then the next Congress can act on it," the Ohioan said.

Wallace Offers Program

While the two major parties were sparring over the approaching session, Third Party Presidential Candidate Henry A. Wallace outlined a four-point law-making program topped off with repeal of the new draft law.

Wallace also called for a minimum wage of at least \$1 an hour in place of the present 40-cent figure; a price roll-back to 1946 levels and "adequate" housing. He addressed a rally at Asbury Park, N. J., yesterday.

Without taking sides in the presidential race, the CIO published a "voting guide" over the weekend, listing Congress members and whether "in the labor organization's view — they voted 'right' or 'wrong' on a long list of issues during the past 18 months.
