Douglas County Rodeo Featured In Publication

The cover page of "Rodeo Life," monthly rodeo photo digest, printed by the Rodeo Life Publishing Co., Portland, is the picture taken at the recent Roseburg's fourth annual Douglas County Sheriff's Rodeo, showing Virgil Hixon being mauled by Christensen Brothers new \$1000 bull, Iodine.

"Thanks to quick action by top bullfighter, Felix Cooper, Hixon escaped with nothing more serious than a broken nose and a few bruises," the caption under the picture, reprinted inside on page 2, states.

The closeup action shot shows the episode probably more graphically than witnessed by most of the spectators in the stands across the field. Cooper was able to attract the bull's attention to spare the rider's life.

Pictures inside show Screen Star Leo Carillo and Rodeo Queen Dixie Emerson photographed together on their mounts. Other pictures of the Roseburg rodeo, all taken by De Vere Helfrich, show Dan Poore on Blackie, Eddie Akridge dogging, Larry Daniels on Orphan Annie, and Eddie Akridge being thrown off Lepay. A list of the final winners in the various events is included.

Forest Fire Danger In Oregon Increasing

PORTLAND, July 17, (AP)—The danger of forest fire was slowly rising in Oregon today, spurred by high temperatures and fairly low humidities.

The weather bureau reported fire danger "high" in southwestern and eastern Oregon, but only moderate in northwestern Oregon. Humidities dropped yesterday 30 per cent—the point at which logging must cease—in several Willamette Valley points, and were expected to do the same today.

There are 30 members in the club, in addition to associate, inactive and honorary members.

Traffic Deaths In Oregon Counties Shown in Report

SALEM, Ore., (AP)—Twenty-two counties had fewer traffic fatalities in 1947 than they did in 1946, Secretary of State Newberry reported in announcing final accident figures for last year.

Twelve counties had an increase, and two were unchanged. Gilliam, Grant and Sherman Counties didn't have a traffic death during the year. Lane and Marion Counties had the biggest decrease in traffic deaths, while Josephine and Umatilla Counties had the worst increases.

Following are the traffic deaths by counties during the last year: Multnomah, 94, including 53 in Portland; Lane, 32, Linn, 26, Clackamas, 25, Umatilla, 24, Marion, 20, Jackson, 18, Klamath, 17, Washington, 15, Douglas and Josephine, 14, Columbia and Yamhill, 13, Baker and Polk, 10, Clatsop, 9, Benton and Malheur, 8, Lincoln and Wasco, 7, Curry and Deschutes, 6, Coos, Jefferson and Tillamook, 5, Harney and Morrow, 4, Lake, 3, Crook and Hood River, 2, Union, 11, Wallowa and Wheeler, 1, Gilliam, Grant and Harney, none.
