Motor Express Sued as Result Of Traffic Crash

Two suits in circuit court have been filed against the Los Angeles-Seaside Motor Express, Inc., as the result of an accident May 18 on Highway 99 between Myrtle Creek and Canyonville, involving the defendant's truck and trailer and a car driven by Edward Thompson.

La Vada Patch, plaintiff in one suit, asks \$10,000 general damages, \$550 special damages, and costs and disbursements for injuries she allegedly sustained. Thompson in the other suit asks damages of \$1199 for the alleged demolishing of his car, \$1000 for personal injuries and \$15 for medical expenses.

Both suits state that Thompson was driver of the car traveling south, that Robert Lee Steele was driver of the truck and trailer, owned by the defendant, Los Angeles-Seaside Motor Express, traveling north, and that Mrs. Patch was a passenger in Thompson's car.

Negligence is the charge against the defendant in each suit. The complaints allege the

truck and trailer were being driven on the wrong side of the highway around a curve, with the driver's view obstructed, and that the trailer was propelled into Thompson's car, a 1941 Ford Tudor sedan, causing the car to be forced off the highway. The complaint also alleges the truck driver was traveling at an excessive speed.

Injuries Set Forth

Mrs. Patch alleges she was thrown against the interior of Thompson's vehicle, and that she suffered the following injuries: a broken upper jaw, two teeth knocked out, two teeth struck so violently they had to be extracted, dislocated jaw, the left side of her face cut and bruised, the interior of her mouth severely cut, severe bruises and abrasions on both arms and legs, severe sprain of the left knee and severely wrenched neck. The complaint states the injuries required hospitalization of 15 days, and caused "excruciating mental and physical pain and anguish over a long period."

Thompson alleges that in addition to the damage to his car he suffered injuries as follows: Severe bruises and contusions on both arms from the shoulder to the wrist, severe abrasions and lacerations on both knees and on the face, severe bruises and contusions to the chest.

Danger of War With Russia Seen By London Press

LONDON, July 19.—(P)—The London Press, surveying the Berlin situation, spoke frankly today of the danger of war between Russia and the west.

"The war of nerves is reaching its height," said the London Times, adding:

"The challenge in Berlin requires immediate and clear decision. So long as the Russians remain obdurate the dangers will mount."

"Each side is being driven on to the point where an open clash might become unavoidable."

"Neither side desires war; yet, as measures and counter-measures increase, the combination of an incident and a rising belief that only force can settle the issue might produce a clash beyond control."

"We are delighted to welcome the American airmen who this week-end returned to airfields in Britain," Labor's pro-government Daily Herald announced, adding: "No one on this side of the Iron curtain wants war. But, equally, no one here is prepared to be bullied in defiance of agreements."

The Daily Express noted that "the world slides once more, after so pitifully short an interlude, into a situation fraught with the danger of war."

"We must face the fact that war has once again become a possibility," said the conservative Daily Graphic. "That means we must be prepared for it."

Theater at Yoncalla Makes Improvements

YONCALLA.—Mr. and Mrs. Fred Merk announced that many changes have been made in the Eagle Theater of Yoncalla which will add greatly to the comfort of the patrons.

A new room has been added to be used for a "cry room," where restless babies may be taken care of while their mothers enjoy the pictures. A clear plateglass provides a good view of the screen and a loud speaker brings the sound from the film into the room.

New seats have been ordered, which have been designed and made specifically for the Eagle Theater. They are of a new model. They are large and have deep spring cushions and padded backs. Also, the latest theater floor covering will be used in the lobby and aisles.

Fire Warden Killed In Truck Accident

DALLAS, Ore., July 19.—(P)—A water tank truck overturned in loose gravel on Boulder Creek road 25 miles northwest of here Friday killing Clay Taylor, 60, of Route 1, Monmouth.

Taylor, fire warden for the Willamette Valley Lumber Company, was for several years a member of the State Police Game Department, former city marshal at Monmouth and widely known farmer.

J. Paul Bollman, Polk county coroner, said the accident occurred when the tank truck's footbrake failed and Taylor applied the emergency brake forcefully. The water in the tank sloshed forward and caused the truck to weave and finally overturn in the loose gravel.

Taylor crushed under the tank. A fellow employee of the lumber company, Ernest Comer, suffered a crushed hand.
