

Camp Fire Girls' Grounds On Umpqua River Open Sunday With 52 Participants on Hand

Camp Tye, the Camp Fire Girls grounds located on the Umpqua River 15 miles west of Sutherlin, opened Sunday with 52 girls registered. First meal for the girls was cooked and served in the dining hall Monday morning.

Over 50 men and women from Roseburg worked throughout the day in an effort to complete construction of the camp facilities, and by evening the buildings were finished sufficiently for use. Some work still remains, such as adding screening to the dining hall and applying the finishing touches to the shelters, but this can be accomplished later.

The entire project, all of which has been handled through donated materials and volunteer labor, would represent many thousands of dollars if the materials had to be purchased and the labor hired, it is reported by Camp Fire Council members.

Conn, nature instructor, Miss Joyce Morgan, camp craft, Miss Betty Staham, hand craft, and Mrs. William Woods, camp cook.

Mrs. Ernest Patterson and Mrs. Hall Seelye, registered nurses, are sharing the first week at the location as camp nurses.

Henninger's Mart on South Stephens Street is announced as the receiving depot for any items which parents or others wish to send to the girls at camp. The articles should be plainly marked. Letters or cards may be addressed to the girls at Camp Tye, through Oakland, as the site is on a direct mail route.

Physical examinations are being given today and Wednesday at the county health office at 10 a.m. and 2 p.m. for girls who plan to attend next week. There are 56, the full quota, already registered, for the second session
