Hessell Retains Mat Crown By Beating Angelo

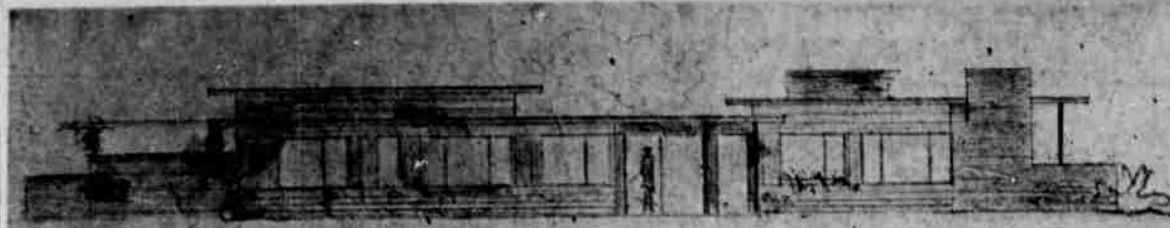
Popular Gordon Hessell crawled for the ropes, as the crowd cheered, to break what appeared to be a sure-fire Boston crab hold, and retain his light-heavyweight championship title Saturday night at the Armory. Seconds later, Hessell upon returning to the ring, floored his opponent, Challenger Bruno Angelo, with a drop kick, and pinned on top to take the third and deciding fall with a body press.

Hessell seldom resorts to unethical tactics, but none of the spectators seemed to blame him for crawling, for if he had lost his title it would have been to the villainous Angelo, who had used every unethical method in the books to batter his foe into helplessness. It appeared twice in the fight that he was going to win out. That title and belt must have loomed big to Hessell, as he lay on his stomach on the mat and saw his hopes fast fading. He had lost the first fall of the bout by this same Boston crab hold to the powerful Angelo, who was an artist at applying the pressure.

From the opening gong it was apparent Hessell was after the title by whatever means he could take it. He started the rough stuff by using his fists on Hessell's body to break the first hold of the bout. Hessell managed to keep Angelo in hot water most of the first session with a damaging head scissor. Every time Angelo broke loose, the champ would nail him again. When Angelo finally freed himself the match turned into a slugfest, and when it appeared Hessell was about to subdue his opponent, Angelo grabbed the champ's legs and turned him over for a Boston crab in 11 minutes.

The remainder of the bout was full of rough stuff, Hessell finally cornering Angelo with a wicked trigger hold after both fighters were nearly out on their feet from head blows and body slams. The round lasted six minutes. In the third series, Angelo had Hessell practically helpless after three times battering him against the corner ropes, then rolled him over for a Boston crab, which Hessell broke by going under the ropes.

Ted Williams Tops American Batters Despite Injury

CHICAGO, July 20.—(AP)—Although sidelined last week with a side injury, Boston's Ted Williams maintained the American League leadership in batting, runs scored and two base hits. Cleveland's Lou Boudreau, however, captured one specialized lead from the idle Williams—going ahead in hits with 106. The Beantown slugger has 102.

Boudreau gained four points in the batting race. The Indians' shortstop-manager upped his bat mark to 359—29 points behind Williams' leading 388 clip.

Al Zarilla of St. Louis retained third place with 333 followed by George Kell, Detroit, 332; and Bob Brown, New York, 322. Williams' 66 runs scored and 21 doubles kept him in front of those departments. Vern Stephens of Boston was tops in runs-batted-in with 77 and New York's Joe DiMaggio led in triple production with 10. Ken Keltner of Cleveland had 22 home runs and Washington's Gil Coan retained his base

of his teammates, Tommy Holmes and the incapacitated Eddie Stanley, each at 329, and Jeff Heath, 315.

Musial Headed For Swat Lead In National League

NEW YORK, July 20.—(AP)—Barring a complete collapse, Stan Musial of the St. Louis Cardinals should capture the National League batting title.

Although he dropped 11 points during the abbreviated week of play, his 392 is still 39 points better than any other player in official averages through Sunday.

Second spot fell to Andy Pafko of the Chicago Cubs. The converted third baseman surged past Richie Ashburn of the Philadelphia Phillies into the runner-up spot with 353. Ashburn, the fleet-footed rookie outfielder, fell to third with 340.

Alvin Dark, the rookie shortstop of the Boston Braves, who came to life after a slow start, is in fourth place at 322. Following Dark in that order were three

General Pershing Laid to Rest In Arlington Grave

WASHINGTON, July 19.—(AP)—John Joseph Pershing, cavalryman, came to the end of a long trail today in Arlington's green hills.

There, in the National Military cemetery, among the other soldier dead, a grave was opened for the 87-year-old general.

The trail started out more than 60 years ago through the mountains and deserts of the south-west where yesterday's cavalry fought the Indians. It passed through the war with Spain, the Philippines and command of the American Expeditionary Force in France in the First World War.

Down the trail was acclaim by a grateful nation, and the title "General of the Armies," conferred previously only on George Washington.

At its end was a great tribute.

The president, who thirty years before had been a junior officer in Pershing's expeditionary force, came to the high-domed great rotunda of the Capitol yesterday afternoon to take a last look at his former chief, who lay in state there. With ex-artilleryman Harry Truman were high officials of the government and of the military.

Out in the capitol plaza and the blistering streets leading to it were thousands of the people who remembered the general. They filed slowly by the black-draped catafalque, thirty to the minute, for hour upon hour.

Today, putting aside the grave duties arising from the threat of still another war, Mr. Truman prepared to attend the funeral ceremonies at Arlington, this time as President of the United States.

The army planned the greatest military funeral since the unknown soldier was buried.

Deans Creek Lumber Co. Soon to Start Mill

REEDSPORT—Within the next weeks a new sawmill, that of Deans Creek Lumber Co., will commence operation on the Napier ranch on Deans Creek, about six miles east of Reedport. Owned by E. E. Burgeuss and Harold Shortridge, the mill was started last November and is now completed and ready for operation. The mill is designed to cut
