

Squirts Shut Out Wards, Pastime Defeats Plywood

At Finlay Field last night, the two underdog softball teams showed occasional flashes of brilliance but blew up during the course of the evening as the Squirts took advantage of the first-inning Montgomery Ward errors to win, 6-0, and Sutherland Pastime was aided by six Umpqua Plywood bobbles as the Taverners won, 11-3.

An indication of the final outcome of the Squirts-Wards game was given in the first inning when Squirts pitcher Swede Vang struck out the first three Ward batters and then his team mates tallied four runs in their half of the initial inning.

Not until the third inning could the Ward boys get a man on first base and he landed there

through a fielding error. After the first inning, both teams went scoreless until the first of the seventh when the Squirts connected for three hits, including Lovell Baker's triple, and tallied their final two runs.

Vang's no-hit, no-run ball game was spoiled in the first half of the final inning when Montgomery Ward Manager Lewis McAllister connected for a double to register Wards' only hit of the game. With two men on bases, Wards might have scored, but the Squirts bore down and picked two runners off the bases and the last batter popped out to the first baseman to end the game.

Sutherland took an early two-run lead in the top of the first inning when Brick Avery, acting manager, blasted a terrific home run into left field and raced home scoring Montgomery ahead of him.

Debate in 6th Inning Umpqua Plywood threw a scare into the Taverners in the last of the fifth when two walks and an error filled the bases with one out. A run scored when C. Atterberry capitalized on the new ground ruling to race home when Montgomery threw in a wild pitch. The next man struck out but another walk filled the bases again. A second attempt to score on a passed ball went awry when the catcher recovered the ball in time to relay to Montgomery and nab the runner a step before he reached the plate.

Until the sixth inning, Umpqua Plywood played errorless ball and looked like a very much improved team. But at this point, the Plywood outfield fell to pieces as they committed five of the six

ATHLETICS TAKE TWO FROM CHISOX

Cleveland Defeats Senators in 11th; Gordon Hits Homer

The Philadelphia Athletics narrowed Cleveland's American League lead to one game when they swept both ends of a doubleheader from the Chicago White Sox, 6-0 and 6-4. Dick Fowler pitched a seven-hit shutout in the opener for his ninth victory. He has lost only two, Phil Marchildon gained credit for his seventh victory in the nightcap.

The Indians overcame an early 6-3 deficit to win an 11-inning thriller from the Washington Senators, 7-6. A single by Bob Kennedy scored Larry Doby from second with two out to give Steve Gromek, the Tribe's seventh pitcher, the victory.

Joe Gordon accounted for three Cleveland runs with a home run. It was his 18th of the year and the 200th of his major league career.

Doerr Hits Grand Slam
Bobby Doerr slammed a home run off Fred Sanford with the bases loaded in the first inning for all of Boston's runs as the Red Sox defeated the St. Louis Browns, 4-1, at Boston. It was Doerr's 17th of the season.

Rain washed out a game between New York and Detroit at the Yankee Stadium after only one inning had been completed. The Yankees had taken a 3-0 lead, Yogi Berra supplying two of the tallies with a home run.

Three-Way Deadlock
Leo Durocher is off to a splendid start in the toughest baseball job he's ever tackled—managing his erstwhile worst enemies, the New York Giants.

Preparing to tangle with the St. Louis Cardinals in a crucial series with second place perhaps at stake, the Giants under Durocher have won three out of four games to pull up within a half game of the runnerup spot, now in a three-way deadlock.

Yesterday the Giants scored a 14-2 out of the Reds in Cincinnati with 18 hits. Larry Jensen went the route for his 11th victory. He permitted only seven hits, including Hank Sauer's 26th home run, "hat tied Sauer with Ralph Kiner of Pittsburgh for the major league lead.

The Pittsburgh Pirates moved into a three-way tie with Brooklyn and St. Louis for second place when they won a 1-0 shutout victory over the National League leading Boston Braves. All three teams now trail by seven and a half games. Danny Murtaugh's infield single off the glove of Pitcher Johnny Sain in the seventh scored Ralph Kiner from third with the only run of the game.

Although tagged for 11 hits, including Andy Pafko's 16th home run, Emil (Dutch) Leonard pitched the sixth place Philadelphia Phillies to a 5-4 victory over the cellar-dwelling Chicago Cubs.

Second Half Of Softball Season Play Scheduled

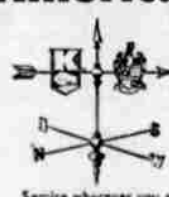
