Mount McKinley Scaled by Three Alaska Students

FAIRBANKS, Alaska, July 21.—(AP)—Three University of Alaska students claimed today to have conquered North America's highest peak—22,770-foot Mount McKinley.

One of the climbers, 25-year-old Walter Gonnason of Carnation, Wash., informed the Fairbanks News-Miner by telephone that the trio reached the summit at 1 p. m., July 13, after a 25-day trip from Wonder Lake, north of the mountain.

With him were Charles Pieper, 25, of Deerfield, Ill., and John McCall, 25, of Eapin, Colo.

Two companions—Philip Spalding, 25, of Vermont, and Ed Hutzler, 24, of Maine—were unable to continue past the 18,000-foot elevation, he said. They remained in camp during the one-day assault on the top.

Gonnason said the party had only five days of good weather during the climb over the route blazed a year ago by a cosmic ray research expedition led by Bradford Washburn, nationally known mountain climber. They passed the hours playing bridge, he said.

At the summit, the party recorded a temperature of 20 degrees below.

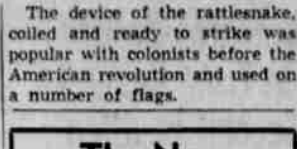
